## Course Outline

A consideration of Pindar's achievement as a lyric poet with special emphasis on epinician poetry. Selected odes will be read closely with a view to language and style, as well as the social and intellectual context of Pindar's poetry. In addition, there will be some discussion of Bacchylides, the other major surviving exponent of classical epinician song.
