

ES2250Y: Introductory Field Mapping Techniques – Second Year Field Camp 2015

Instructors:

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Corequisite: [Earth Sciences 2200A/B](#) and registration in a module or program where [Earth Sciences 2250Y](#) is mandatory; or registration in an Earth Sciences Minor and a minimum mark of 60% in [Earth Sciences 2200A/B](#).

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Academic Counselor to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

Description and Course Format: This course is held from May 1-11. The field camp takes place near the village of Whitefish Falls, which is on the north shore of Lake Huron, approximately 25 km south of Espanola, Ontario. A pre-trip meeting will take place in late February or early March prior to the May 1 departure.

The main tasks of participants in the field course include:

1. producing a geological map
2. producing a stratigraphic section
3. conducting a geological traverse
4. measuring crossbeds for paleocurrent analysis
5. geophysical mapping using a magnetometer
6. participating in day fieldtrips
7. writing a final exam on May 9

If a student misses the departure of the vans, fails to be present for any of the days of instruction (including the departure and return days), or fails to participate, marks will be deducted from the student's final grade. The amount deducted will be determined by the course instructor(s), but could range up to 10% per day.
