

Canada Research Chair (Tier 2) in Activity and Aging

The Faculty of Health Sciences (FHS) at Western University invites applications for a Tier 2 Canada Research Chair (CRC) in *Activity and Aging*. The Faculty of Health Sciences is home to the <u>Canadian Centre for Activity and Aging</u> (CCAA); a research centre with over a 32-year history of promoting physical activity and the health and well-being of older adults through a combination of basic and applied research, educational resources, and community-based programs. The Chair will play a role in the scientific leadership of the CCAA. The Chair also will join a growing group of FHS researchers focused on mobility and activity, including two Endowed Chairs (William and Lynne Gray Endowed Research Chair in Mobility and Activity, and the Frank J. Hayden Endowed Chair in Sport and Social Impact).

The Faculty of Health Sciences invites applications from researchers working in the broad areas of health, activity, and aging. These areas include physiological and psychological aspects of aging; social inclusion and barriers to participation with aging; health policy and promotion of activity and aging, among other areas broadly related to activity and aging. The successful candidate will have a strong record of multidisciplinary and collaborative research that is aligned with the overall strategic plan and research priorities of the CCAA and the Faculty of Health Sciences (<u>https://www.uwo.ca/fhs/about/files/strat_research_plan_2016.pdf</u>). In keeping with the CRC Tier 2 status of this position, the successful candidate will be assigned a workload where the majority is in research, with smaller percentages in teaching, including mentoring students in aging research, and in service.

The successful candidate will be appointed at the rank of Assistant Professor (tenure track) or Associate Professor with Tenure in the appropriate <u>School within the Faculty of Health Sciences</u>. Salary and rank are commensurate with qualifications and experience, with an anticipated start date of July 1, 2022. The successful candidate will have a PhD or equivalent and will have a background in a health-related discipline such as Health Sciences, Nursing, Kinesiology, or Rehabilitation Sciences. The successful candidate's research interests will be supported by a record of external funding, peer-reviewed publications, and national/international exposure through invited lectures and/or conference symposia as appropriate for their discipline and career stage. Evidence of research leadership or potential would be beneficial. In short, the successful candidate will be an emerging researcher with demonstrated research activity and creativity, acknowledged by peers as possessing the potential to achieve international recognition and to lead in their field in the next five to ten years, and possess the potential to attract high quality personnel and future research collaborators. Finally, the successful applicant will show evidence of contributing to equity, diversity, and inclusion in academia.

In addition to the CCAA, FHS is home to several highly regarded research centres including the <u>Centre for Research on</u> <u>Health Equity and Social Inclusion</u>, the National Centre for Audiology and the <u>International Centre for Olympic Studies</u>. The Faculty also supports close collaborative research links with the <u>Lawson Health Research Institute</u>, <u>Robarts</u> <u>Research Institute</u>, <u>Gray Centre for Mobility and Activity</u> at Parkwood Institute, <u>Western Institute for Neuroscience</u>, <u>Bone</u> <u>and Joint Institute</u> and the <u>Institute for Earth & Space Exploration</u>, whose research scientists can play pivotal roles in <u>Activity and Aging</u> research. The FHS is well-positioned as a progressive, multidisciplinary Faculty with core expertise in areas that will support the work of the successful candidate.

With annual research funding exceeding \$220 million, and an international reputation for success, Western ranks as one of Canada's top research-intensive universities. Our research excellence expands knowledge and drives discovery with real-world application. Applicants who are more than 10 years from having earned their highest degree (and where career breaks exist, such as maternity, parental or extended sick leave, clinical training, etc.) may have their eligibility for a Tier 2 Chair assessed through the program's Tier 2 justification process; please contact Research Development at The University of Western Ontario at <u>ResearchWesternCRC@uwo.ca</u> for more information.
