### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

Phonology studies the organization of the speech sounds and their patterned interactions. This course covers such topics as Articulatory and Acoustic Phonetics, Distinctive Feature Theory and Phonological Processes. We will analyze data phonological data from diverse languages within the SPE framework formalizing our analysis in a form of rules.

### PEDAGOGICAL OBJECTIVES

On successful completion of this course, students will be able to

- Effectively use the basic phonological terminology in data description and analysis
- Describe a phonological variation using the appropriate terminology
- Identify phonological patterns and propose their analysis
- Analyze phonological processes and variation within a given framework
- Evaluate existing proposals of phonological variation
- Compare phonological analyses for strengths and weaknesses

**NOTE:** This syllabus may be adjusted as required throughout the term. All students are responsible for attending class for information in this regard and checking Announcements on OWL regularly.

### **METHODS**

The following methods will be used during this course:

- class lectures (complementing the textbook)
- solving problems sets with discussion
- reading at home and raising questions
- solving problem sets

*Important:* Reading the textbook will not replace class lectures and discussions in class. In order to obtain a good mark, you should regularly attend classes. If you have a reason to be absent, let me know in advance.

### METHODS OF EVALUATION

NB: Students do not have the option of doing additional work to bring up their grade.

*The final exam* and *the midterm* will present problem sets based on the material presented in class and in the book. Students arriving more than 30 minutes after the after the midterm has begun will not be admitted. Details about the format of the midterm and the exam will be given in class.

*In-Class Tests* will be given twice throughout the semester. They include some theoretical concepts covered in class as well as solving problem sets. Coming to class as well offered tutorials will help you stay on track with all the material and the skills that you need to develop throughout the entire course.

*Participation* is your regular attendance and involvement in all classroom activities. Your responses in class will compose your participation mark. Studying regularly will help you to correctly respond to questions in class and get a higher participation grade as well as prepare you for the tests and exams. Full attendance and participation is essential to do well in any linguistics course. In addition, since we only meet once a week, missing one class means missing a whole week's worth of material. If you do miss a class, you are responsible for obtaining the material covered that week from one of your classmates.

<u>Grades cannot be adjusted</u> for the reason of need (e.g. I just need two points), performance in other courses (e.g. I am an "A" student), poor performance due to illness or personal problems (unless documented and on file with the Academic Counseling Office of your Faculty).
