HURON UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

HISTORY

Effective May 1, 2008, History 2179: The Two World Wars, will be introduced at Huron University College. The course is currently offered on Main Campus and at King's University College.

History 2179: The Two World Wars

An examination of the causes, course and consequences of the First and Second World Wars, stressing comparison of the two conflicts. Students will be asked to consider a variety of historical analyses of both wars and to study the process of interpretation as well as events.

2 hours, 1.0 course

POLITICAL SCIENCE

Effective May 1, 2008, the name and course description for Political Science 2299E: The British Political Tradition, will be revised.

Political Science 2299E: British Politics: Continuity and Change

A historical and analytical examination of the themes of continuity and change in British politics, with particular focus on the constitution, government, democracy, political parties and ideologies. Issues such as nationalism, terrorism, race, multiculturalism, and Britain's relations with the European Union and the USA are also considered.

Prerequisite(s): Political Science 1020E.

3 lecture hours, 1.0 course.

FACULTY OF LAW

Effective September 1, 2008, Law 5854 A/C/D: Shareholder Remedies, will be introduced by the Faculty of Law.

Law 5854A/C/D: Shareholder Remedies

Canada has the most comprehensive statute-based shareholder remedies in the common law world. Students will examine them against the historical background of less generous shareholder protection and statutes from other jurisdictions. Each student will write a paper on one of the remedies. Antirequisite(s): the former Law 371d.

Four credits, one term.

KING'S UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

PHILOSOPHY

Effective May 1, 2008, Philosophy 1360E: The Great Human Questions We All Ask, and 1361E: Finding Happiness: A Journey Through Philosophy, will be introduced at King's University College.

Philosophy 1360E: The Great Human Questions We All Ask

An introduction to the great human questions we all ask: Who are we? Why are we? How can we live a good life? Why do we suffer, die, encounter evil? What are sex, love, and friendship? What can we know? What ought we to do? What may we hope for?

3 hours, 1.0 course.

Philosophy 1361E: Finding Happiness: A Journey Through Philosophy
 How do we find happiness in life? Is it through the fulfillment of desire, be it for pleasure, wealth, fame, companionship, knowledge, or union with God? Perhaps, paradoxically, it is by abandoning desire altogether and leading a simple life. This course will explore how philosophy has responded to these issues.

3 hours, 1.0 course.

FACULTY OF INFORMATION AND MEDIA STUDIES

BA/LLB COMBINED DEGREE PROGRAM

Effective May 1, 2008 the structure of the MIT/Bachelor of Laws program will be revised to bring it in line with other combined degree programs within the faculty. Students interested in pursuing the combined program must now apply during their third year of the Honors Specialization module in MIT (pp 105-106 in the 2008 Academic Calendar).

COMBINED BA HONORS SPECIALIZATION IN MEDIA, INFORMATION AND TECHNOLOGY (MIT)/ BACHELOR OF LAWS (LLB) PROGRAM

The combined BA Honors Specialization MIT/LLB program is administered on behalf of the Faculty of Information and Media Studies (Media, Information and Technoculture) and the Faculty of Law by the two administrators (Program Directors), one of whom is appointed by the Faculty of Information and Media Studies and the other by the Faculty of Law. The combined program allows students to complete both the LLB and BA Honors Specialization – Media, Information and Technoculture degrees in six academic years instead of the seven years required if the degrees were taken separately.

Successful applicants to the combined program will enter first-year Law after completing three years of the Honors BA, Honors Specialization in MIT.

Admission to the Combined Program

Applicants to the combined program will apply in the third year of the Honors Specialization in MIT to the Associate Dean of FIMS in advance of the deadline established by the Faculty. A separate application must also be submitted to the Faculty of Law in accordance with the submission deadlines advertised in the University of Western Ontario Academic Calendar, indicating the student's intention to pursue the combined program. To be eligible for the combined program, students must have a cumulative, weighted average of 80% in their first three years of the Honors Specialization in MIT. In addition, candidates must meet the minimum LSAT requirement established by the Law School Admissions Committee and be admitted to the Faculty of Law.

Meeting the minimum requirements does not guarantee a position in the combined program.

Year One

Completion of all first-year requirements in the Faculty of Information and Media Studies with no failures. For admission into the Honors Specialization in MIT, students must have an average of at least 72% in 4.0 principal courses, with no mark in any principle course below 60%, and a minimum grade of 70% in each of MIT 1200F/G, 1500a/b and 1700F/G.

Year Two

Students must take:

- 2.0 courses: MIT 2000F/G, 2100F/G, 2200F/G, 2500A/B
- 0.5 course: Writing 2121F/G
- 1.0 MIT course at the 2000 level or above
- 1.5 options at the 2000 level or above

Note: MIT 2020F/G and MIT 2021F/G are strongly recommended for students interested in pursuing the combined program.

Year Three

Students must take:

- 1.0 course: MIT 3000A/B, 3100F/G
- 2.0 MIT courses at the 2000 level or above
- 2.0 options at the 2000 level or above

Year Four

Students must take first-year Law. No courses outside of Law may be taken during this year.

Years Five and Six

- (a) the two compulsory upper-year Law courses;
- (b) at least three Law core-group courses;
- (c) additional Law courses totaling at least 25 credit hours, of which one course must have an essay requirement of at least two credit weights;
- (d) 3.0 MIT courses at the 2000 level or above, including at least 0.5 at the 4030-4049 level.

Progression Standards

Once admitted to the combined program, students must meet the regular progression requirements of both Faculties. Students must maintain a B average in their Law courses and meet the general regulations pertaining to progression and graduation requirements for the Honors BA.

A student who fails to meet the combined program progression standards in any year must withdraw from the combined program. However, if that student has met the progression standards of either the MIT or LLB program, he or she will be allowed to proceed to the next year of that program. If that student has satisfied the progression standards of both individual programs, he or she may continue in either program and may petition the Faculty whose program was not selected for permission to complete that program at a later date.

A student who is required to withdraw from the combined program and continues with either or both of the individual programs must complete all the degree requirements of the individual program or programs in order to graduate from that program or those programs.

Exchange Programs

Students enrolled in the combined program may be eligible in Years Five or Six for an exchange program offered only through the Faculty of Law. This will require advanced planning with both Faculties.

Dean's Honor List

Students are considered for the Dean's Honor List in the Faculty of Information and Media Studies in Years One, Two and Three. In the Year Four, they are considered for the Dean's Honor List in the Faculty of Law. A student who takes Law courses totaling at least 12 credit hours in each of Years Five and Six of the program is considered for the Dean's Honor List in the Faculty of Law in each of those years on the basis of those courses. In the Faculty of Information and Media Studies, students may be eligible for the Dean's Honor List in Years Five and Six.

Graduation with Distinction

Eligibility to graduate with distinction for each degree is determined by each Faculty.

Gold Medal

Students in the combined program are eligible to be considered for the Gold Medal in either or both degree programs, along with other eligible graduating students in those programs, as determined by the requirements in each Faculty.

SPANISH

Effective May 1, 2008, the antirequisites for Spanish 2223: Business Spanish, will be corrected to list only “The former Spanish 023”.

Antirequisite(s): The former Spanish 023.

VISUAL ARTS

Effective May 1, 2008, Visual Arts Studio 2200: Drawing, will be revised by the removal of the phrase “Extension of this approach with other media and disciplines” from the course description.

VAS 2200: Drawing
An introduction to drawing as an investigative tool for perceptual, technical, conceptual and critical problem solving.
Antirequisite(s): VAS 2204A/B, 2210, 2212A/B and 2214A/B.
Prerequisite(s): VAS 1020.
Priority will be given to students registered in a Visual Arts program.
6 studio hours, 1.0 course.
Note: Some sessions may involve drawing from the nude (female or male) as a required component of the course.

Effective May 1, 2008, Visual Arts Studio 2246A/B: Digital Photography, will be revised by the removal of VAS 2250 (Introduction to Contemporary Media) as an antirequisite.

Prerequisite(s): VAS 1020
Priority will be given to students registered in a Visual Arts Program.
6 studio hours, 0.5 course.

Prerequisite(s): VAS 2230, 2232A/B, 2234A/B or 2236A/B. Priority will be given to students registered in the Visual Arts program.

VAS 3350: Advanced Media Art

Prerequisite(s): VAS 2250, 2252A/B or 2254A/B. Priority will be given to students registered in the Visual Arts program.

VAS 3351A/B: Time-based Production I: Digital Sound

Prerequisite(s): VAS 2250, 2252A/B or 2254A/B. Priority will be given to students registered in the Visual Arts program.

VAS 3352A/B: Time-based Production II: Digital Video

Prerequisite(s): VAS 2250, 2252A/B or 2254A/B. Priority will be given to students registered in the Visual Arts program.

VAS 3353A/B: Illumination: Lighting in Visual Art Production

Prerequisite(s): VAS 2240, 2244A/B, 2250, 2252A/B or 2254A/B or permission of the Department. Priority will be given to students registered in the Visual Arts program.

VAS 3354A/B: Interactive Media Environments

Prerequisite(s): VAS 2250, 2252A/B or 2254A/B. Priority will be given to students registered in the Visual Arts program.

VAS 3355A/B: Media Installation

Prerequisite(s): VAS 2250, 2252A/B or 2254A/B and one other 2200-level VAS course. Priority will be given to students registered in the Visual Arts program.

FACULTY OF EDUCATION

Effective May 1, 2008, the Faculty of Education will introduce a new course Education 5616: Intermediate Additional Basic - Law, by Distance Education. The Intermediate Additional Basic - Law has been offered in conjunction with the other Intermediate courses which are all currently numbered, FC E 30. With the new specific numbering system, the Intermediate Additional Basic - Law, requires an individual course number. The number proposed is 5616.

Intermediate Additional Basic - Law EDUC 5616
<p>Course Description</p> <p>Using an integrated approach to curriculum, this course will enable teachers to receive additional qualifications for the intermediate division in one subject area (general studies). Topics such as curriculum planning, teaching strategies and assessment of learning experiences for the intermediate division will be included in this course.</p>
<p>Admission Requirements</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. A Certificate of Qualification, Interim Certificate of Qualification, Certificate of Qualification (with conditions) or Letter of Eligibility; (A hard copy is required for the Letter of Eligibility only. Verification of the other documents will be done online via the Public register of the Ontario College of Teachers.) 2. An acceptable university degree; 3. Two full-year university courses to support the subject for which qualification is sought. (An official transcript(s) is required. Fax a copy to us upon registration AND follow up with an official transcript sent directly from the issuing institution. Note that course weights vary across institutions. Courses weighted as 3 credits are likely to be half courses.)
