## **BRESCIA UNIVERSITY COLLEGE**

### *RELIGIOUS STUDIES AND PHILOSOPHY*

Effective September 1, 2009, Philosophy 2661F/G: Philosophy of Religion, and 2662F/G: Topics in the Philosophy of Religion, will be added to the course offerings at Brescia. Substitution of 2 half courses for Philosophy 2660 will provide greater scheduling flexibility for students and the Department.

#### Philosophy 2661F/G: Philosophy of Religion

An examination of issues in philosophy of religion, focusing on arguments concerning the existence of God, the immortality of the soul, the occurrence of miracles, the validity of religious experience, and the place of religion in morality. Independent critical thinking is stressed and no particular religious views are presupposed.

Antirequisite(s): Philosophy 2063E, 2660E, and the former Philosophy 144F/G.

3 hours, 0.5 course

(Brescia, Huron)

#### Philosophy 2662F/G: Topics in the Philosophy of Religion

An examination of special topics in the philosophy of religion, e.g., the basis of religious faith and knowledge, the relationship between religion and science, religious diversity, the nature of God, and grace and predestination.

Antirequisite(s): Philosophy 2070E, 2660E and the former Philosophy 144F/G.

3 hours, 0.5 course

Effective September 1, 2009, the Major in Religious Studies, the Major in Philosophy, the Minor in Philosophy, and the Minor in Religious Studies and Philosophy at Brescia be modified to bring module first-year requirements in Philosophy modules into line with the requirements at main campus, and to reflect the introduction of Philosophy 2661F/G and 2662F/G at Brescia in all affected modules

## **MAJOR IN RELIGIOUS STUDIES**

### **Admission Requirements**

Completion of first-year requirements, including 1.0 course in Religious Studies at the 1020 or 1030 level with a mark of at least 60%.

### **Module**

6.0 courses:

1.0 course from: Philosophy 2660E or 2661F/G and 2662F/G, Religious Studies 2137, 2249E.

1.0 course from: Religious Studies 2192F/G, 2216F/G, 2217F/G, 2222F/G, 2232F/G, 2251F/G, 2257F/G, or the former Religious Studies 191F/G (W04, W07).

4.0 courses in Religious Studies at the 2200 level or above.

## **MAJOR IN PHILOSOPHY**

### **Admission Requirements**

Completion of first-year requirements. 1.0 course from Philosophy 1100E, 1200, 1300E, 1350F/G, 1230A/B, 1250F/G or 1370A/B is recommended.

### **Module**

6.0 courses:

1.0 course from: Philosophy 2200F/G, 2202F/G, 2500F/G, 2700F/G.

5.0 additional courses in Philosophy at the 2200 level or above, at least 2.0 of which must be at the 3000 or 4000 level.

## **MINOR IN PHILOSOPHY**

### **Admission Requirements**

Completion of first-year requirements.

2.0 courses from: Philosophy 2017E, 2063E, 2067E, 2070E, 2090E, 2554E, 2660E or 2661F/G and 2662F/G.

2.0 additional courses in Philosophy at the 2000 level or above.

**MINOR IN RELIGIOUS STUDIES AND PHILOSOPHY****Admission Requirements**

Completion of first-year requirements, including 1.0 course at the 1020 or 1030 level in Religious Studies with a mark of at least 60%. Completion of 1.0 course in Philosophy at the 1000 level is recommended.

Effective February 1, 2009 (to be offered in Intersession), First Nations Studies 2236A/B and Religious Studies 2236A/B, both entitled "Introduction to North American Indigenous Spirituality", will be introduced at Brescia University College.

First Nations Studies 2236A/B: Introduction to North American Indigenous Spirituality

Introduction to the plurality of indigenous spiritual traditions in North America, and their diversity, complexity, and vitality. Included is an understanding of traditional ceremonies, cosmology or world view, creation stories and other narrative forms, cultural values, healers, and medicine. Special attention is given to Anishinaabe and Haudenosaunee nations.

Antirequisites(s): Religious Studies 2236A/B

Prerequisite(s): Completion of any Arts and Humanities or Social Science 1.0 course.

Effective September 1, 2009, History 2706E: Youth Cultures in the Twentieth Century, will be introduced at Huron University College.

History 2706E: Youth Cultures in the Twentieth Century

This course will examine twentieth-century youth cultures in Canada, Britain and the United States: flappers, 'Swing Kids', rebellious teenagers, mods, hippies, punks, and hip hop, to discover their changing natures, their relationship to the dominant society and the official reactions to them.
