Recommended: That effective May 1, 2006, for the Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies at Brescia University College:

- BMOS Major modules be introduced in: Accounting; Management and Organizational Studies; Organizational and Human Resources; and,
- Bachelor of Administrative and Commercial Studies Specialization modules be reintroduced as BMOS Specialization modules in: Finance and Administration; Finance and Administration with French; Organizational and Human Resources; Organizational and Human Resources with French.

BACHELOR OF MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATIONAL STUDIES (BMOS)

The Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies degree at Brescia provides students with a four-year career-oriented program, combining management and organizational studies with a broad background in the social sciences and liberal arts.

The BMOS Honors degree includes one of the following three Major modules: Accounting, Management and Organizational Studies, or Organizational and Human Resources, in combination with another Major module in another discipline.

The BMOS (Four-Year) degree offers the following four specializations: Finance and Administration, Finance and Administration with French, Organizational and Human Resources, and Organizational and Human Resources with French. Specializations may be combined with a Minor in another discipline.

BACHELOR OF MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATIONAL STUDIES (BMOS) HONORS DEGREE

Admission Requirements

Students may not apply to the BMOS Honors Double Major when they apply for admission to Brescia. Students may apply for admission upon successful completion of 5.0 first-year requirements, with an average of 70%, and no grade less than 60% in the 3.5 principal courses:

1.0 course: Business Administration 020

0.5 course: Management and Organizational Studies 020a/b*

1.0 course from: Calculus 050a/b, 051a/b, 081a/b; Linear Algebra 040a/b; Mathematics 028a/b, 030, 031

1.0 essay course: Sociology 021E

* Note: If MOS 020a/b has not been completed, a substitute course in Year 1 will be calculated in the admission average, but MOS 020a/b must be completed prior to graduation.

In addition to meeting the above requirements, students must successfully complete the admission requirements for a Major module in a discipline other than Management and Organizational Studies. If admission requirements are not met for both of the Majors, students will not be permitted to register in the BMOS Honors Degree program and may apply to a BMOS Specialization module or to another degree program.

To apply to the BMOS Honors program (Double Major) after the second year, students must have received an overall average of at least 70% on the last 5.0 courses, including no grade less than 60% in any of the principal courses, and an overall cumulative average of 65%. In addition, students must successfully complete the admission requirements for a Major module in a discipline other than Management and Organizational Studies.

Students wishing to continue in the BMOS Honors program at Brescia University College should refer to the Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies (BMOS) Honors Degree information in the Social Science section of the UWO Calendar.

4a **Social Justice and Peace Studies**

Recommended: That effective September 1, 2006, the policy on Records Check and Vulnerable Sector Screening be approved for Social Justice and Peace Studies at King’s University College.

RECORDS CHECK AND VULNERABLE SECTOR SCREENING

The Social Justice and Peace Studies program at King’s University College at The University of Western Ontario does not require a Criminal Records Check or other screening procedure (e.g., Vulnerable Sector Screening {VSS}) as a condition of admission into its programs. However, prospective students should be aware that a criminal record check or VSS may be required by other facilities used for practicum placements, or experiences related to an academic course assignment. It is the student’s responsibility to have the necessary procedure completed. In some programs, students will not be permitted access to such courses without having completed this requirement.

Students will share VSS or other record check information directly with the facility or agency for which they have been assigned a placement and may, if they wish, disclose the results to their Program Coordinator. Students unable to complete a placement requirement because they are unable to meet a facility’s requirement for such a screening, or because a facility refuses to accept them on the basis of the information contained in the record check or other screening procedure, will not be eligible for progression or graduation. Those students registered in an internship placement, clinical practice placement or co-op as a course requirement may not be able to pass the course if they have not met an agency’s requirement, or if the agency refuses to accept them on the basis of the information contained in the record check or other screening procedure. Students should check with their Program Coordinator for details as to the policy on course access and to the time frame within which a screening must be completed.

The statement's inclusion is also an acknowledgement that the majority of clinical placement sites are requiring such checks already, and makes formal and public the relative student, Faculty and University roles and responsibilities associated with this requirement.

4b Social Work Practicum

Recommended: That effective September 1, 2006, the general description of the Social Work Practicum at King's University College be revised to clarify the roles and responsibilities associated with a Records Check and Vulnerable Sector Screening.

Practicum

Assignments to Practica will be determined by the Coordinator of Field Instruction following consultation with students. Students should be aware that there may be financial costs (such as parking, transportation, manual and insurance) and special agency requirements (such as police checks and health requirements) associated with the Practicum. A car may be needed for some community-based placements.

Neither The University of Western Ontario nor King's University College requires a Criminal Records Check or other screening procedure (e.g., Vulnerable Sector Screen [VSS]) as a condition of admission into the Bachelor of Social Work (Honors) program. However, prospective students should be aware that a criminal records check or VSS may be required by other facilities used for field placements or experiences related to an academic course assignment. In such cases, it is the student's responsibility to have the necessary procedure completed. Students will not be permitted access to such courses without having completed this requirement.

Students will share VSS or other record check information directly with the facility or agency to which they have been assigned a placement and may, if they wish, disclose results to the School of Social Work. Students unable to complete a Practicum because they are unable to meet a facility's requirement for such a screening, or because a facility refuses to accept them on the basis of the information contained in the record check or other screening procedure, will not be eligible for progression or graduation. Students enrolled in a Practicum may not be able to pass the course if they have not met an agency's requirement, or if the agency refuses to accept them on the basis of the information contained in the record check or other screening procedure. Students should check with the School of Social Work for details regarding course access and the time frame within which a screening must be completed.

Background:

The revision to the Practicum statement clarifies student, School and University roles and responsibilities associated with a Records Check and Vulnerable Sector Screening.

4c Thanatology

Recommended: That effective September 1, 2006, the policy on Records Check and Vulnerable Sector Screening be approved for Thanatology at King's University College.

However, prospective students should be aware that a criminal record check or VSS may be required by other facilities used for clinical or practicum placements, or experiences related to an academic course assignment. It is the student's responsibility to have the necessary procedure completed. In some programs, students will not be permitted access to such courses without having completed this requirement.

Students will share VSS or other record check information directly with the facility or agency for which they have been assigned a placement and may, if they wish, disclose the results to their Program Coordinator/King's University College. 5. **Faculty of Information and Media Studies: Admission to Media and the Public Interest Program**

Recommended: That admission to the Honors Specialization and Major modules in Media and the Public Interest, offered by the Faculty of Information and Media Studies, be moved from third to second year; that the admission, progression and graduation requirements be revised to conform with current approved requirements for modules in the MIT Program; and, that minor curriculum modifications be introduced to accommodate the change to a second-year entry program, effective September 1, 2006.

HONORS SPECIALIZATION IN MEDIA AND THE PUBLIC INTEREST (MPI)

Admission Requirements

Completion of first-year requirements in the Media, Information and Technoculture (MIT) program with no failures. All 5.0 first-year courses will be considered as principal courses. Students must have an average of at least 72% in these principal courses, including Media, Information and Technoculture 025a/b and 026a/b and Computer Science 031a/b with a mark of at least 65% in each, with no mark in any course below 60%.

Background:

MPI was approved initially as a program with entry in third year. Advancing entry to the second year will bring MPI into line with Media, Information, and Technoculture (MIT), the largest undergraduate program in FIMS. This, in turn, will assist with student recruitment into MPI. Revising the admission, progression and graduation requirements for MPI modules to match the previously-approved requirements for MIT modules will streamline the requirements for all modules offered in FIMS. Modifications to the modular requirements in MPI will give students more flexibility if they wish to combine their program with modules in other subject areas.

6. **Western-Fanshawe Collaborative Nursing Program: Admission Requirements**

6a **Changes to Admission Requirements For All Secondary School Applicants**

Recommended: That effective for the 2007-2008 application cycle, all secondary school applicants to the Western-Fanshawe Collaborative BScN program must have completed the requirements outlined below to receive admission consideration.

 - Gr. 11 U Functions

Applicants with High School Standing from other Canadian Provinces

Applicants from other provinces in Canada are eligible to apply for admission on the basis of senior matriculation if their academic records meet, in subject matter and standing obtained, both the admission requirements of this School and the admission requirements of a recognized university in their own province. **This must include the successful completion of (university preparation) courses in English, Biology, Chemistry and Mathematics (comparable to Ontario Grade 11 Functions & Relations), with a minimum grade of 60% in each.**

6b **Changes to Admission Requirements for Post-secondary Applicants**

Recommended: That effective for the 2007-2008 application cycle, all applicants to the Western-Fanshawe Collaborative BScN program who currently are enrolled in a university, or who previously have attended a university or other post-secondary institution, must have completed the requirements as outlined below to receive admission consideration.

Applicants Currently Enrolled in a University, or who Previously have Attended University or other Post-Secondary Institutions

Entry to the Western-Fanshawe Collaborative BScN program is on a competitive basis. Applicants applying to transfer into or enter the nursing program are considered on the basis of their OSSD average and university or other post-secondary standing. Specifically,

- students applying with one year of full-time university study must have achieved a minimum 70% overall average;
- students having completed two or more full-time years of university may be admitted on the basis of a minimum overall average of 70% in the final two years of study.
- students applying from part-time university study will be admitted on the basis of a minimum 70% average in the last 10 courses completed.
- students applying from a community college must have achieved an overall GPA of 2.5 in a completed program.

All applicants must also have completed **the equivalent of the following Ontario secondary school courses with a minimum grade of 60% in each:**

- Gr. 12 U English
- Gr. 12 U Biology
- Gr. 12 U Chemistry
- One of:
 - Gr. 11 U Functions and Relations
 - Gr. 11 U Functions

Background for 6a) and 6b):

Currently, applicants are required to achieve a minimum mark of 60% in Grade 12 U-level Biology and Grade 12 U-level Chemistry only. Given the importance of mathematics and writing competence in the nursing profession, it is critical that students achieve a minimum academic standing of 60% in the Mathematics and English requirements to support their success in nursing education.

7. **Faculty of Engineering: BSc/MD Degree in Electrical Engineering and Medicine; Admission from CAATs**

7a **BSc/MD Concurrent Degree Program in “Electrical Engineering and Medicine”**

Recommended: That effective September 1, 2006, a limited-enrolment concurrent degree program leading to a BSc in Electrical Engineering and an MD degree from the Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry, be introduced in the Faculty of Engineering.

F. Electrical Engineering and Medicine

Admission

Before entering the concurrent BSc/MD degree program, students must have completed the first three years of the Electrical Engineering program at Western, Option F (Electrical Engineering and Medicine). In addition to applying for the concurrent degree program through the Office of the Associate Dean - Academic of the Faculty of Engineering, students must also make a separate application for admission into the MD program. As a part of the application process, students must write a letter to the Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry (Admission Office) indicating their intent to proceed into the concurrent BSc/MD program.

Admission Criteria

To be eligible for the concurrent degree program, students must have completed all the requirements of the first-year curriculum in the Faculty of Engineering with a minimum year-weighted average

(YWA) of 80%, and the second and third year program of Option F (Electrical Engineering and Medicine), in the Department of Electrical and Computer Engineering, with a minimum year-weighted average (YWA) of 80% in each year. In addition, the applicant must meet the minimum performance standards in the MCAT and GPA, determined by the Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry, and must be invited and attend a personal interview with the Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry. A confidential assessment form, proficiency in English and Basic Life Support Training also are required.

Entrance into the concurrent degree program is competitive and limited.

Admission Procedures

A student interested in the concurrent BESC/MD program will apply during the February registration period of the first common year of the Engineering program for admission to the Electrical Engineering Program, Option F (Electrical Engineering and Medicine). The student must write the MCAT in April or August before the third year of the Electrical Engineering and Medicine Program, for the following year's admission into the MD Program. Students must apply to the MD Program by the deadline established (usually October) by the Ontario Medical School Application Service (OMSAS) during the third year of the Electrical Engineering and Medicine Program.

Admission to the BESC portion of the program does not guarantee admission to the MD program.

Progression Requirements

A student enrolled in the concurrent BESC/MD degree program must satisfy the following progression requirements:

Year 2: a minimum YWA of 80% in courses taken as a part of Option F (Electrical Engineering and Medicine)

Year 3: a minimum YWA of 80% in courses taken as a part of Option F (Electrical Engineering and Medicine)

Year 4: progression requirements of the MD Program and successful completion of engineering courses.

Year 5: progression requirements of the MD Program

Year 6: progression requirements of the MD Program

Year 7: progression requirements of the MD Program and successful completion of engineering courses.

If the student fails to satisfy the conditions above, he or she will be required to withdraw from the concurrent program and will be required to transfer out of Option F into one of Options A, B, or C in the Electrical Engineering Program.

Background:

The Faculty of Engineering, along with the Schulich School of Medicine, currently offers accelerated, combined degree programs leading toward a Bachelor of Engineering Science degree and an MD degree, for students enrolled in the Department of Mechanical & Materials Engineering and the Department of Chemical & Biochemical Engineering. Admission into the program is very competitive and enrolment is limited. Students wanting to enroll in the combined program must maintain a minimum "A" average in the first two years of the Engineering program, attain an acceptable MCAT score, and undergo a competitive interview process with the Faculty of Medicine. These highly competitive programs have been very successful in attracting to both Faculties exceptional, high-achieving undergraduate students who are interested in a technology-oriented academic education with medical practice.

The proposal is to extend this opportunity to students enrolled in the Department of Electrical & Computer Engineering. Exceptional students interested in technology-dependent medicine and in biomedical engineering will be given the opportunity to pursue an education in a basic Electrical Engineering curriculum combined with an education in Medicine. The impact of technological changes on Medicine, and the need for medical researchers to be competent in electronic systems, communication and imaging technology, will make this attractive to students. The program will require seven years of academic study rather than the normal eight years if the student chose to complete the two degrees separately.

7b Faculty of Engineering: Admission Requirements from CAATs

Recommended: That the admission requirements to the Faculty of Engineering from the Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology (CAAT) be revised to reflect more accurately the Faculty's policy toward College transfer credit.

3. On the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Engineering, and in consultation with the relevant department(s), the Office of the Registrar may grant advanced standing in Chemistry, Physics, Calculus, Linear Algebra, Computer Science, or complementary studies, to students admitted to the undergraduate Engineering program who have attained a cumulative average of "A" (3.5 g.p.a.) or higher from a completed three-year technology program. Courses in Engineering Science and Engineering Design taught at a CAAT will not be considered for transfer credit toward the BESC degree.

Background:

The current calendar copy states, “On recommendation of the Dean of Engineering, the Office of the Registrar may grant advanced standing for up to a maximum of 9.0 courses....” This often is misinterpreted by college students who want direct admission into Engineering programs with transfer credit to reduce their academic requirements for their university degree. Many college applicants assume incorrectly that they can bypass all, or most, of the first-year program in Engineering, and that they will receive transfer credit for their advanced technical specialization. The proposed change will list those subjects offered in the first year of the Engineering program where transfer credit *may* be possible. Furthermore, to receive any transfer credit for CAAT courses the student must have attained an “A” (3.5 g.p.a.) average or higher in their college courses as determined by the University Admissions Office.

The Faculty of Engineering at Western does not give academic transfer credit for college courses in Engineering. The policy has been revised to stipulate courses in “Engineering Science” or “Engineering Design”. This decision complies with the guidelines established by the Canadian Engineering Accreditation Board (CEAB) and helps to ensure high-quality graduates from our professional Engineering degree programs. Engineering technology programs offered through the CAATs have lower admission requirements, and their programs and academic curriculum are not accredited by the CEAB.

Carol Buck Graduate Scholarship (Faculty of Graduate Studies, Epidemiology & Biostatistics)

Awarded to a full-time graduate student in Epidemiology & Biostatistics at the end of his/her first year, based on academic achievement (minimum 78%) and development of his or her thesis project. A faculty committee in the Department of Epidemiology & Biostatistics will select the recipient. The committee will include representation from at least one faculty member who is also a member of the Faculty of Graduate Studies. This award was established through Foundation Western to honour Dr. Carol Buck, MD, PhD, DipPH, FRS (Can), a former professor in the Department of Epidemiology & Biostatistics.

9. **Editorial Amendment to the Calendar Copy for BMOS Graduation Requirements**

An editorial amendment has been made to the Graduation Requirements approved at the last meeting of Senate (S.06-25). The calendar copy has been changed

From: “To graduate ... All students require 2.0 designated essay courses and 1.0 course from the Faculty of Arts and Humanities to graduate. Writing courses may not be used to fulfill the 1.0 course Arts and Humanities requirement.”

To: “To graduate...All students require 2.0 designated essay courses, at least 1.0 of which must be a senior course (numbered 100-499). In addition, 1.0 course from each of the Faculties of Arts and Humanities, the Faculty of Science and one other faculty must be included. Writing courses may not be used to fulfill the 1.0 course in Arts and Humanities requirement.”

The new wording pertains to the Essay Course Requirements and Breadth Requirements outlined on page 31 of the 2006 Academic Calendar.
