1. Faculty of Graduate Studies: Health Sciences Programs (MSc and PhD)

1a MSc Programs

- Recommended:**
- 1) That admission to the MSc Communication Sciences and Disorders, MSc Occupational Therapy, and MSc Physical Therapy, be discontinued, effective September 1, 2006, and,
 - 2) That current students enrolled in the MSc programs in Communication Sciences and Disorders, Occupational Therapy and Physical Therapy prior to September 1, 2006 be permitted to graduate in their intended degree programs as long as completion is no later than the Summer 2010 term, and that these graduate degrees be withdrawn effective August 31, 2010, and,
 - 3) That any new students enrolling in the MSc Health and Rehabilitation Sciences be permitted to do so effective September 1, 2006.

1b PhD Program

- Recommended:**
- 1) That admission to the PhD Rehabilitation Sciences be discontinued, effective September 1, 2006, and,
 - 2) That current students enrolled in the PhD Rehabilitation Sciences prior to September 1, 2006 be permitted to graduate in this degree program as long as completion is no later than the Summer 2010 term, and that this graduate degree be withdrawn effective August 31, 2010, and,

- 3) That any new students enrolling in the PhD Health and Rehabilitation Sciences be permitted to do so effective September 1, 2006.

Background:

The Health and Rehabilitation Sciences Master's degree (MSc, HRS) was approved by OCGS in August 2006, and the proposed PhD program was approved by OCGS in December 2006. Both degrees were approved by UWO Senate in December 2005, contingent on OCGS approval. Note that the current PhD Rehabilitation Sciences will be renamed PhD Health and Rehabilitation Sciences. It is a name change only with no change in the structure or content of the program.

The MSc Health and Rehabilitation Sciences degree will replace the following current degrees:

- MSc Communication Sciences and Disorders
- MSc Occupational Therapy
- MSc Physical Therapy

The following Master's degrees in these discipline areas will continue to be offered:

- MCISc Communication Sciences and Disorders
- MSc (OT)
- MPT

A course-based degree was proposed by Physical Therapy and is under review by OCGS, namely, an MCISc Physical Therapy.

2. **Faculty of Graduate Studies: Collaborative Graduate Program in Environmental Science to be renamed Environment and Sustainability**

Recommended: That, pending OCGS approval, the name of the existing Collaborative Graduate Program in Environmental Science be changed from Graduate Program in Environmental Science to Graduate Program in Environment and Sustainability.

Background:

This request is currently under review by the Ontario Council on Graduate Studies, together with a request for approval of a proposed new course-based interdisciplinary Master's program in Environment and Sustainability (MES).

3. **Faculty of Graduate Studies: Master of Environment and Sustainability (MES) Program**

Recommended: That, pending OCGS approval, a new Master of Environment and Sustainability degree (MES) be introduced in the Faculty of Graduate Studies, effective September 1, 2007.

Background:

The OCGS appraisal process for this program is under way, with the expectation that approval will be granted in Spring/Summer 2007.

Brief Description/Elements of the MES Program

Course-Based Master of Environment and Sustainability degree:

Western has a strong and growing community of scholars involved in both education and research in the area of environment and sustainability. As reported by the Environmental Careers Organization of Canada, there is a significant shortage of environmental professionals in Canada. In addition, there is a national need and demand for individuals who bring a broadly based, interdisciplinary understanding to sustainable development. This new interdisciplinary course-based program will provide students from diverse social science, engineering and science backgrounds with the additional knowledge needed to complement their undergraduate degrees.

The one-year program will consist of two terms of graduate courses followed by one term of supervised, professional work placement. The 5.0 Full Course Equivalent (FCE) graduate courses will consist of 3.5 FCE core courses and 1.5 FCE advanced study stream courses in one of four areas:

Environmental Assessment & Management
Ecosystem Health
Sustainable Development
Water Science & Engineering

The work placement will be equivalent to 2.5 FCEs in scope.

Anticipated Enrolment

The UWO enrolment anticipated for the September 2007 inaugural class of MES students is 20-25.

4. Faculty of Graduate Studies: Interdisciplinary Master of Arts Program in Popular Music and Culture

Recommended: That, pending OCGS approval, a new interdisciplinary MA program in Popular Music and Culture be introduced in the Faculty of Graduate Studies, effective September 1, 2007.

Background:

Information regarding the interdisciplinary MA degree program in Popular Music and Culture proposed jointly by the Don Wright Faculty of Music and the Faculty of Information and Media Studies

The scholarly study of popular music is a form of cultural practice occurring at the intersection of music, technology, economy, society and culture. For this reason, the proposed graduate program in Popular Music and Culture at Western has been designed to be interdisciplinary in its approach to research and scholarship, drawing on the combined insights and methodologies of numerous disciplines, including musicology, media studies, sociology, history and political economy, among others.

At present, Canadian students must go abroad to the UK or the US to find a graduate program focused explicitly on Popular Music and Culture. Now, because of a series of recent initiatives at the University, Western is well positioned to respond to student demand for a graduate program in this area. First, the creation of the Faculty of Information and Media Studies in 1997 (with its BA, MA and PhD degrees in Media Studies) has given rise to a concentration of research and teaching expertise in media and popular culture in general, and popular music in particular. FIMS already offers a number of undergraduate courses dedicated in whole or in part to the study of popular music. Second, the Department of Music History within the Don Wright Faculty of Music has been offering undergraduate courses in popular music since 2000. Already, undergraduate students may study popular music through three degree programs: a BMus in Music

History with a stream in Popular Music, a BA with a Specialization in Music Administrative Studies, and the new BA in Popular Music Studies. The last program, the only four-year degree at a Canadian university with a major in popular music, trains creative musicians who have a broad understanding of music within society.

Brief Description and Objectives of the Program

Popular Music Studies is not itself an established discipline; it is nonetheless a well-developed and rapidly expanding field of enquiry that traditionally has been situated within multiple disciplines (Music, Communication/Media Studies, Sociology, to name but three). Recognizing the interdisciplinary nature of this field of study, this program has been designed to be offered by the Faculty of Information and Media Studies and the Faculty of Music, drawing on the strengths and resources of both faculties.

As proposed, the Master's degree in Popular Music and Culture can be completed by full-time students in five terms by pursuing any one of the following three streams: (1) coursework with thesis; (2) coursework with creative project; or (3) coursework with a viva voce examination. Admission requires a four-year Honors degree or equivalent in Communications, Media Studies, Music, or some other related field, and applicants must demonstrate knowledge of popular music and the ability to manage the curriculum's diverse requirements.

The aim of the proposed program is to foster scholarship and research in the emerging area of popular music studies. As with other MA programs at Western and elsewhere, one of the primary aims is to offer opportunities for advanced research to promising young scholars, and to prepare the best among them for doctoral programs in music, media studies, communications or other related disciplines. Our goal is to train future academic leaders and cultural workers who will have a broad understanding of key theoretical frameworks, research approaches, issues and debates in popular music studies together with a specialized knowledge within a particular chosen area pursued in depth. The emphasis is on developing students with skills in research and analysis and an understanding of theory.

Uniqueness of the Program and Anticipated Enrollment

Currently, no such program exists in Canada. This proposal will provide a unique graduate program integrating cultural and musicological approaches to popular music studies. It will build on existing interdisciplinary initiatives and research collaborations between the Don Wright Faculty of Music and the Faculty of Information and Media Studies, particularly the Interdisciplinary Media Centre (IMC) equipped with support from a CFI grant.

An initial intake of 5-6 students is expected, although as many as 10 could be accommodated in the first year. Once the program is fully running, an intake of 8-10 students per year is anticipated, for a steady-state enrollment of 16-20.

5. Faculty of Graduate Studies: Master of Arts Program in Linguistics

Recommended: That, pending OCGS approval, a new MA Program in Linguistics be introduced in the Faculty of Graduate Studies, effective September 1, 2007.

Background:

The OCGS approval process for this program is underway, with the expectation that approval will be granted in the spring or summer of 2007.

While never coming together as a department, Linguistics has been taught as an undergraduate subject area in Anthropology at Western for decades. In the last fifteen years, several linguists have been hired in the Faculty of Arts and Humanities, mainly in the Department of French Studies, but also in Modern Languages

and Literatures. This has led to a renewed wealth of experience and interest in Linguistics as a cohesive discipline for which there is significant student demand across disciplinary boundaries. The success of the recently created undergraduate program in Linguistics at UWO confirms the strength of the discipline at The University of Western Ontario. Through the enthusiastic and effective participation of linguists on campus, a Canada Research Chair in Linguistics and a state-of-the-art research facility for Linguistics (the Theoretical and Applied Linguistics Laboratory: <http://ling.uwo.ca>) have been obtained.

The objective of the course-based MA program in Linguistics is to foster scholarship and research in the discipline, both for students who are planning on continuing with a PhD program in Linguistics, and for those who will be seeking professional work in a range of fields (such as education, communicative disorders, speech technologies, or elsewhere) for which a background in Linguistics is either required or very useful. This diverse faculty, made up of researchers from various fields (including Anthropology, Computer Science, Communication Sciences and Disorders, Education, French Studies, Modern Languages and Literatures, Philosophy, and Psychology), will offer students direct training in current research methods from a wide range of theoretical and empirical perspectives, enabling them to undertake independent research of their own in Linguistics.

The six-term program will be administered by a program director and program committee, and the administrative home of the program will be in the Faculty of Arts and Humanities. The curriculum requirements are 4.0 full graduate course equivalents plus a research paper.

The intake for the Master's program will be approximately 5-10 students a year.

6. **Faculty of Graduate Studies: Master of Arts Program in Women's Studies and Feminist Research**

Recommended: That, pending OCGS approval, a new MA Program in Women's Studies and Feminist Research be established in the Faculty of Graduate Studies, effective September 1, 2007.

Background:

The OCGS approval process for this program is under way, with the expectation that approval will be granted in the spring or summer of 2007.

The MA in Women's Studies and Feminist Research will respond to a growing demand for feminist scholarship at the post-graduate level. Women's Studies is an interdisciplinary field, using feminist methodologies to analyse the ways in which gender interacts with race, age, class, ability/disability and sexual orientation to shape human consciousness and determine the social, political and cultural organization of human society throughout history. Because gender systems exist in all cultures and many domains of life, women's studies scholars work across the disciplines, and combine methodologies and theoretical paradigms in new transformational ways. In the last quarter of the 20th century, feminist scholarship transformed the knowledge base in many disciplines, but research within existing disciplines cannot provide the interdisciplinary perspective that characterizes the knowledge base of women's studies and informs the curricula of established women's studies programs.

Students in the program will develop a critical understanding of gender as a category of analysis in scholarly enquiry, social dynamics, cultural expression, and belief systems, and will investigate the ways in which gender intersects with other variables such as race, class and cultural difference. They will study women's contributions to civilization in many fields of knowledge, and examine the social and ideological forces that have made these contributions invisible in the past.

The three-term graduate program leading to the MA in Women's Studies and Feminist Research will be administered by a Committee on Graduate Studies, elected by the Department. The curriculum requirements

are either 4.0 full graduate course equivalents, or 3.0 full graduate course equivalents plus an independent research project.

The Department of Women's Studies and Feminist Research is housed in the Faculty of Arts and Humanities, and is sponsored jointly by the Faculties of Social Science and Arts and Humanities. In keeping with the Department's interdisciplinary mandate, a number of feminist scholars from across campus have affiliation agreements with Women's Studies, and will be involved as members of the Women's Studies MA program for purposes of teaching and supervision.

The intake for the MA program will be 10 students per year.

7. **Faculty of Science: Specialization in Applied Mathematics**

Recommended: That a Specialization in Applied Mathematics be introduced in the Faculty of Science, effective September 1, 2007.

Admission Requirements

Completion of first-year requirements, including 1.0 of the following with a mark of at least 60%: Calculus 050a/b and 051a/b (or Calculus 081a/b with a mark of at least 85%) or Applied Mathematics 026.

Linear Algebra 040a/b or Applied Mathematics 025a/b with a mark of at least 60%, normally taken in Year 1. If not taken in Year 1, Linear Algebra 040a/b must be taken in the first term of Year 2.

Module

9.0 courses:

0.5 course from: Calculus 250a/b or 280a/b

0.5 course from: Calculus 251a/b or 281a/b

0.5 course: Differential Equations 215a

1.0 course: Applied Mathematics 213b, 261b

6.5 courses from: Applied Mathematics 301a/b, 303a/b, 310F/G, 311a/b, 315a/b, 320b, 325a/b, 353a/b, or any Applied Mathematics 400-level course, Computer Science 210a/b, 211a/b, 212a/b/y, Mathematics 208a/b, 221F/G, Physics 343a/b, 351a/b, 365a/b, Statistical Sciences 257a, 260b, 325a/b, 357a. 8. **New Scholarships, Awards and Bursaries**

SCAPA has approved on behalf of the Senate the following Terms of Reference for new scholarships, awards and bursaries, for recommendation to the Board of Governors through the Vice-Chancellor:

Clinical Excellence Awards (Faculty of Health Sciences, Nursing)

Awarded to an undergraduate student in the final level of the Compressed Timeframe BScN Program within the School of Nursing. The recipient will have demonstrated excellence in all five domains of practice in each clinical rotation and have been recognized by faculty and/or clinical practice agencies as an exceptional practitioner. The School of Nursing Scholarships and Awards Committee will select the recipient. These awards were established by a gift from Dr. Warren Whelen and Mrs. Catherine Whelen (BScN '62).

Value: 2 at \$462

Effective: 2006-2007 only

In February 2006, Mr. Aubrey Dan committed a lump-sum gift of \$5,000,000 for endowment at the University in support of the Program in Management and Organizational Studies. As part of his gift, \$925,000 was allocated in support of Undergraduate Student Awards, to be known as the Dancap Investments Undergraduate Awards in Management and Organizational Studies, subject to necessary approvals. The following are awards which will be funded by this gift.

Dancap Private Equity Second-Year Student Award (Faculty of Social Science, Management and Organizational Studies)

Awarded to the full-time student in any Major or Specialization of the Aubrey Dan Program in Management and Organizational Studies with the highest sessional average in Year 2. To receive this award, the student must be continuing full-time in Year 3 of any Major or Specialization of the Aubrey Dan Program in Management and Organizational Studies. The recipient of the Dancap Private Equity Second-Year Student Award is not eligible to receive another Dancap Private Equity Student Award during the same year. This award was established by a generous donation from Mr. Aubrey Dan (BA '85).

Dancap Private Equity Student Award in Commercial Aviation Management (Flight Training) (Faculty of Social Science, Management and Organizational Studies)

Awarded to a full-time student enrolled in Year 3 or Year 4 of the Commercial Aviation Management Major or Specialization of the Aubrey Dan Program in Management and Organizational Studies, based on academic achievement, and demonstrated professionalism, leadership and enthusiasm for flight training. Candidates must have attained a sessional average of at least 75% during the preceding year of full-time study within the MOS program, and an average of at least 80% on both the Private Pilot Licence and Commercial Pilot Licence written examinations taken as part of the UWO/Empire Aviation Integrated Commercial Pilot Licence program. Applications can be accessed online through the Aubrey Dan Program in Management and Organizational Studies Web site or the MOS Main Office. Applications, including proof of the candidate's Private Pilot Licence and Commercial Pilot Licence written examination results, must be submitted to the MOS Office no later than January 15, and include a maximum 500-word statement describing the applicant's

qualifications for the award. Applicants may be asked to attend a brief interview with the Dancap Private Equity Student Awards Committee.

Students need not have completed a Commercial Pilot Licence written examination prior to the application deadline. Although students can apply for more than one Dancap Private Equity Student Award per year, the recipient of the Dancap Private Equity Student Award in Commercial Aviation Management (Flight Training) is not eligible to receive another Dancap Private Equity Student Award during the same year.

Applications must be submitted to the MOS Office no later than January 15 and include a maximum 500-word statement describing the applicant's qualifications for the award. Although students can apply for more than one Dancap Private Equity Student Award per year, the recipient of the Dancap Private Equity Student Award in Commercial Aviation Management is not eligible to receive another Dancap Private Equity Student Award during the same year.

Candidates must have attained a sessional average of at least 75% during the preceding year of full-time study within the MOS program, and an average of at least 80% in MOS 330a/b and any other MOS operations management courses completed. Applications can be accessed online through the Aubrey Dan Program in Management and Organizational Studies Web site or the MOS Main Office. Applications must be submitted to the MOS Office no later than January 15 and include a maximum 500-word statement describing the applicant's qualifications for the award. Applicants may be asked to attend a brief interview with the Dancap Private Equity Student Awards Committee.

Students need not have completed MOS 330a/b or other MOS operations management courses prior to the application deadline. Candidates must have attained a sessional average of at least 75% during the preceding year of full-time study within the MOS program, and an average of at least 80% in MOS 320a/b and any other MOS marketing courses completed. Applications can be accessed online through the Aubrey Dan Program in Management and Organizational Studies Web site or the MOS Main Office. Applications must be submitted to the MOS Office no later than January 15 and include a maximum 500-word statement describing the applicant's qualifications for the award. Awarded to a full-time student enrolled in the Organizational and Human Resource Specialization or Major of the Aubrey Dan Program in Management and Organizational Studies, based on academic achievement for an essay submitted in any one of MOS 280F/G, MOS 341F/G, MOS 344F/G, MOS 352F/G, MOS 355F/G, MOS 356F/G or MOS 485F/G, and demonstrated professionalism, leadership and initiative in extracurricular activities relating to Human Resources Management. Candidates must have attained a sessional average of at least 75% during the preceding year of full-time study within the MOS program, and a minimum grade of at least 80% in the MOS course for which the essay was submitted. Candidates must complete the course for which the essay was submitted in the same academic year during which they make application for the award. Applications can be accessed online through the Aubrey Dan Program in Management and Organizational Studies Web site or the MOS Main Office. Applications must be submitted to the MOS Office no later than January 15 and include a maximum 500-word statement describing the applicant's qualifications for the award, along with an unmarked copy of the essay that is to be considered.
