S.10-103 MINUTES OF THE PREVIOUS MEETING

The minutes of the meeting of May 14, 2010 were approved as circulated.

S.10-104 **REPORT OF THE PROVOST**

Dr. Chakma noted that, since this would Dr. Longstaffe's last meeting of Senate as Provost and Vice-President (Academic), he had invited him to make a report to Senate in place of the usual Report of the President.

In his presentation, Dr. Longstaffe highlighted several areas of continued growth for the University:

• Graduate expansion initiative: This was, and continues to be, a very important step toward becoming a truly great research university;

- Undergraduate education and enrolment: The quality of undergraduates and the quality of the programs we offer them are at the core of the university's mission. There needs to be a strong student voice in developing programs. There are different ways to increase undergraduate enrolment (e.g., increased international student enrolment as an addition to the 4350 cap; enrolling sufficient numbers of students to achieve Western's notional share of accessibility funding which would result in an entering class of about 4900; creating spaces through mechanisms such as dual degrees and niche second-entry programs). SCAPA will need to turn its mind to all of these issues in the near future.
- Internationalization: Increasing the numbers of international students at the University is highly desirable but it needs to be recognized that it is an expensive proposition if it is to be done well. It is very important that the appropriate supports are provided to international students who choose to come here. There also needs to be more funds directed to recruitment of international students.
- Research excellence: Western is a centre of research excellence. More needs to be done to get the word out and gain the appropriate international recognition for what is already being done here.
- Faculty and Staff: The University needs a sustainable growth strategy. Revenue growth needs to be greater than 3% per annum or the University will be forced to shrink. The means to achieve those revenues need to fit the Western environment, but there should be partnerships between the central university and programs for revenue from new initiatives. The UPIF mechanism in the budget has served the university well in the past but needs a full scale review.
- Interdisciplinarity: The move to build more common spaces and meeting places in our physical environment will foster interdisciplinarity. The proposed Institute for Advanced Studies will also have interdisciplinarity as a key principle. The aim of the institute will be to bring together scholars from across disciplines and from across the world to work on shortterm projects with defined goals or outcomes.
- Unifying factors: The University needs to continue to build on its scholarship and intellectual energy. We need a cultural framework, such as a performance hall space to help bring the community together and to bring the external community to the university.

In summing up, Dr. Longstaffe noted that a great university needs the support, hard work and good will of faculty, staff and students, all moving toward common goals. In short, we have to decide "what it is that we want to be."

S.10-108 Faculty of Education: Amendment to the English Language Proficiency Requirement

It was moved by M. Milde, seconded by R. Macmillan,

That the English Language Proficiency requirement for the Faculty of Education be amended as set out in Exhibit II, item 1, effective September 1, 2010.

S.10-109 Faculty of Music: Revised admission requirement for the BA with Specialization in Music Administrative Studies

It was moved by R. Wood, seconded by M. Milde,

That effective September 1, 2010, the admission requirements for the BA with Specialization in Music Administrative Studies be changed to allow students to have one of three courses in mathematics instead of the single mathematics course currently prescribed.

S.10-110 Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry: Revision to the Admission Requirements for the Modules Offered by the Bachelor of Medical Sciences (BMSc) Program

That effective September 1, 2010, the Admission Requirements for the modules offered by the Bachelor of Medical Sciences (BMSc) program be revised so that the minimum mark in each of the Biology, Chemistry, Mathematics and Physics courses required for admission is lowered from 65% to 60%, with the exception of Biology 1201A and 1202B, in which a minimum mark of 70% will be required.

Senate was informed that academic partnerships between the Department of Statistical and Actuarial Science, The University of Western Ontario, and South China University of Technology (SCUT), Nanjing University of Finance and Economics, and Nanjing Audit University, will be established effective September 1, 2010. Students who successfully complete three years of study in China will be allowed to complete their fourth year of studies at Western and will receive a conditional offer of admission to Western's Master of Science (MSc) programs.

S.10-119 School of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies: Electronic Submission of PhD Theses

Senate was advised that effective August 1, 2010, the Thesis Regulation Guide will be revised as set out in Exhibit II, Appendix 4. This is a pilot project in which the electronic submission of PhD theses will be available on a voluntary basis. Current practices for MA theses will remain unchanged.

S.10-123 Enrollment Update for 2010-11 and Planning for Beyond

The Provost provided an update on enrollment for 2010-11 and planning for beyond. The target intake for first year undergraduate enrollment has been 4350. This year's target was increased by 100 spaces for international students bringing the first year enrollment target to 4450 spaces. The international enrolment target will not be met this year; there simply has not been any time to put in place the recruitment resources needed. However, because of a very significant increase in the number of acceptances in the BMSc program, enrolment for 2010-11 will rise to about 4700.
