1. **New IQAP Process**

Recommended: That the Subcommittee on Program Review – Graduate (SUPR-G) and the Subcommittee on Program Review – Undergraduate (SUPR-U) be established with the terms of reference outlined in **Appendix 1**; and

That with the establishment of SUPR-U the existing Subcommittee on Undergraduate Program Review (SUUPR) be discontinued.

Background:

A new “Quality Assurance Framework” (QAF) for the review and approval of undergraduate and graduate programs has been introduced by the Government of Ontario and a new provincial body, the “Quality Council,” has been established. The Quality Council reports to the Council of Ontario Universities (COU) and has responsibility for enforcing and monitoring universities’ adherence to the new framework. The new Quality Assurance Framework requires each institution to define its own “Institutional Quality Assurance Process” (IQAP) to govern the review and approval of all programs within the institution.

The proposed IQAP process follows very closely the processes and practices already in place for introducing new programs and evaluating existing programs at both the undergraduate and graduate levels. For undergraduate programs, the processes are largely those already implemented through SUUPR; for graduate programs, the long-established processes of OCGS will be replaced with internal university mechanisms. Prior to implementation, Western's IQAP must be approved by the Quality Council.

Western's IQAP process must be approved by SCAPA and by Senate before submission to the Quality Council no later than December 2010. Once approved by the Quality Council, the new IQAP process will be phased in and the new subcommittees will be established. 2. **School of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies: Discontinuation of PhD Degree in Social Demography**

Recommended: That effective January 1, 1998, the PhD degree in Social Demography be discontinued.

Background:

A PhD degree program in Social Demography, hosted by the Department of Sociology, was approved to begin in 1978. In 1990 a PhD in Sociology was approved to begin.

In December 1990, UWO Senate approved the following: "That students currently enrolled in the PhD program Social Demography will have the option of choosing the degree designation they prefer; those admitted beginning September 1991 will receive the general PhD in Sociology."

From January 1991 to December 1997, students who were originally admitted to the PhD in Social Demography and who chose to graduate with this degree were grandparented. The last student enrolled in this program withdrew in 1997.

In September 1991, admission to the PhD in Social Demography degree ended and Social Demography continued as a Field of the PhD in Sociology.

The statement approved by Senate in December 1990 implied that admission into the PhD degree in Social Demography was to be suspended in September 1991 and the program discontinued in 1998. However, the withdrawal of the program was never approved officially by SCAPA and Senate. This recommendation corrects that administrative error.

3. **Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry: Dentistry Sessional Dates Revised to Extend the Winter Term in the First-Year Dentistry Program**

Recommended: That the length of the Winter term in First-Year Dentistry be changed from 16 weeks to 18.5 weeks, and that the 2011 Sessional Dates for Dentistry be revised to reflect this change.

Background:

The current length of the Winter term in First-Year Dentistry is 16 weeks. This results in students being required to attend classes, labs and clinics while preparing for several comprehensive examinations. Extending the Winter term will provide an opportunity for suspension of classes and clinics at various times throughout the academic year to allow for study days for students preparing for scheduled comprehensive examinations. In past years, first-year dental students completed final May examinations

during the third week in May. This change will result in first-year dental students competing final examinations by the end of May. This change will not require first-year dental students to attend classes or examinations beyond the month of May and it will not affect current OSAP conditions for first-year dental students. All applicants offered a position in the Dentistry Class of 2014 have been informed of this impending change to the Winter term with their offer of acceptance sent in June 2010. Classes for the First-Year Dentistry class will end on May 17, 2011 instead of April 29, 2011.

4. **Faculty of Science: Revised Admission Requirements for the Honors Specializations in Bioinformatics (Biochemistry Concentration) and Bioinformatics (Computer Science Concentration)**

Recommended: That, effective September 1, 2010, the admission requirements for the Honors Specialization in Bioinformatics (Biochemistry Concentration) and Honors Specialization in Bioinformatics (Computer Science Concentration) offered by the Faculty of Science, be revised.

**HONORS SPECIALIZATION IN BIOINFORMATICS (BIOCHEMISTRY CONCENTRATION)
Admission Requirements**

Completion of first-year requirements with no failures. Students must have an average of at least 70% in 4.0 principal courses, with no mark in these principal courses below 60%, including: Biology 1001A and 1002B, or the former Biology 1222 or 1223; Chemistry 1100A/B and 1200B, or the former Chemistry 1020, 1050, or 023; Computer Science 1025A/B or 1026A/B or Engineering Science 1036A/B or the former Computer Science 036a/b; Computer Science 1027A/B or 1037A/B, in either case with a mark of at least 65%; 1.0 course from: Applied Mathematics 1201A/B, Applied Mathematics 1413, Calculus 1000A/B, 1100A/B, 1301A/B, 1501A/B, Mathematics 1600A/B, the former Linear Algebra 1600 A/B, or the former Calculus 1201A/B.

Note: Biology 1201A with a mark of at least 70% may be used in place of Biology 1001A, and Biology 1202B with a mark of at least 70% may be used in place of Biology 1002B.

Students taking this module must see a Departmental Counsellor in Biochemistry or Computer Science for advice concerning the order in which courses have to be taken.

**HONORS SPECIALIZATION IN BIOINFORMATICS (COMPUTER SCIENCE
CONCENTRATION)**

This module concentrates on the computational aspects of bioinformatics, while at the same time providing students with enough background in the biosciences to appreciate the contexts in which computation is applied.

Admission Requirements

Completion of first-year requirements with no failures. Students must have an average of at least 70% in 4.0 principal courses, with no mark in these principal courses below 60%, including: Biology 1001A and 1002B, or the former Biology 1222 or 1223; Chemistry 1100A/B and 1200B, or the former Chemistry 1020, 1050, or 023; Computer Science 1025A/B or 1026A/B or Engineering Science 1036A/B or the former Computer Science 036a/b; Computer Science 1027A/B or 1037A/B, in either case with a mark of at least 65%; 1.0 course from: Applied Mathematics 1201A/B, Applied Mathematics 1413, Calculus 1000A/B, 1100A/B, 1301A/B, 1501A/B, Mathematics 1600A/B, the former Linear Algebra 1600 A/B, or the former Calculus 1201A/B.

Note: Biology 1201A with a mark of at least 70% may be used in place of Biology 1001A, and Biology 1202B with a mark of at least 70% may be used in place of Biology 1002B.

Students taking this module must see a Departmental Counsellor in Computer Science for advice concerning the order in which courses have to be taken.

Background:

These changes are the result of the changes made to the first-year courses in Biology and Chemistry, specifically the introduction of Biology 1001A, 1002B, 1201A and 1202B, and Chemistry 1100A/B and 1200B, along with the withdrawal of Biology 1222 and 1223, and Chemistry 1050.

5. **Faculty of Science: Withdrawal of Five-Year BSc Honors Mathematical Sciences and Bachelor in Education and of Minor for Concurrent Mathematics and Education Programs**

Recommended: That effective September 1, 2010, admission to the Five-Year BSc Honors Mathematical Sciences and Bachelor in Education and the Minor for Concurrent Mathematics and Education programs be discontinued, and that the program and the module be withdrawn effective September 1, 2014.

Background:

The Faculty of Education Council voted in March 2009 to discontinue this program along with the combined Science/Education program. No students entered this module in the 2010-2011 academic year.

6. **Faculty of Science: Withdrawal of Minor in Advanced Studies in Earth and Planetary Sciences**

Recommended: That effective September 1, 2010, admission to the Minor in Advanced Studies in Earth and Planetary Sciences be discontinued, and that the module be withdrawn effective September 1, 2014.

Background:

This module has been replaced by the four-year Professional Programs. Since students were able to select this module during Intent to Register in February/March 2010, the timeline of September 1, 2014 has been selected to enable those who are currently registered in it sufficient time to complete it.

7. **Faculty of Science and Richard Ivey School of Business: Revised Progression Requirements for the Combined Science/HBA Program**

Recommended: That effective September 1, 2010, the Progression Standards and Failure to Meet Progression Standards requirements for the combined Science/HBA program be revised.

Progression Standards

Students in the combined program must meet the progression standards of each Faculty or School. ~~Students enrolled in HBA1 (Year 3) must attain a minimum weighted average of at least 78%. In Years 4 and 5, students must attain a minimum weighted average of 75% in their 4000 level HBA courses. They also must attain a minimum average of 75% in their Honors Specialization module and meet all other progression requirements of the Honors Specialization module in which they are enrolled.~~

Failure to Meet Progression Standards

A student who fails to meet the combined program progression standards in any year must withdraw from the combined program. However, a student who has met the progression standards of either the HBA or Science program will be allowed to proceed to the next year of that program. ~~If the progression standards of both individual programs have been satisfied, the student may continue in either program and may petition the School or Faculty whose program was not selected for permission to complete that program at a later date. A student who is required to withdraw from the combined program and wishes to pursue either or both of the individual programs, must complete all the degree requirements of the individual program or programs in order to graduate from that/those program(s).~~

Background:

In 2009, revisions were made to the HBA 1 and HBA 2 program requirements and as a result, these need to be reflected in the combined degree program requirements.

8. Faculty of Social Science: Introduction of BMOS Modules

Recommended: That effective, September 1, 2011, the following new program modules be introduced in Management and Organizational Studies:

- Honors Specializations in: Accounting; Consumer Behavior; Finance for Management and Organizational Studies (MOS); Human Resource Management; Commercial Aviation Management
- Double Majors in: Consumer Behavior; Finance for Management and Organizational Studies (MOS)
- Specializations in: Accounting; Consumer Behavior; Finance for Management and Organizational Studies (MOS)

That effective September 1, 2011, admission to existing program modules in the Management and Organizational Studies (MOS) program be discontinued; that students enrolled in the existing MOS program modules prior to September 1, 2011 be permitted to continue with the understanding that they must complete the requirements prior to September 1, 2016; and, that effective September 1, 2016, all existing MOS program modules (prior to those introduced in September 1, 2011) be withdrawn.

Students may choose between two degree options – a Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies (BMOS) **HONORS DEGREE** or a **FOUR-YEAR SPECIALIZATION DEGREE**. MOS offers a 20.0 course Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies (BMOS) Degree as an **Honors Specialization or Double Major (BMOS Honors Degree) or a BMOS Specialization (BMOS Four-Year Degree)** providing students with a four-year degree combining management and social science courses using an evidence-based management approach and drawing on social science methodologies. Evidence-based management stresses the study of managerial decisions and organizational practices informed by the combination of best available management research, facts specific to the situation, practitioner experience and

judgment, and ethics and values. The Commercial Aviation Management module allows students who select the Flight Training option the opportunity to obtain a Commercial Pilot's License.

Students applying to MOS with the Ontario Four-Year Grade 12 curriculum must complete an Ontario Secondary School Diploma including: completion of six Grade 12U or M courses, including English (ENG4U) and two of either Advanced Functions (MHF4U), Calculus and Vectors (MCV4U) and Math of Data Management (MDM4U). Although Calculus is not required for admission, students admitted to MOS without a Calculus background may be required to take Mathematics 0110A/B in addition to two half-courses in Mathematics at the 1000-level or Calculus 1100A/B in addition to one half-course in Mathematics at the 1000-level during first year in order to meet certain course/module requirements.

Students may **not** apply into any of the BMOS modules when they apply for admission to the University. After first year, students registered in MOS may apply to a BMOS Specialization (BMOS Four-Year Degree) if a 65% cumulative average is attained. After first year, students registered in MOS who wish to apply to the BMOS Honors Degree (Honors Specialization or Double Major) must meet the Admission Requirements for the module they wish to apply to. Students registered in MOS prior to September 2011 may follow the course and Admission Requirements outlined in the Academic Calendar in the year in which they were first admitted. BMOS students applying to transfer from an Affiliated University College may apply with the stated first-year course requirements from that college and must meet Admission Requirements.

BACHELOR OF MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATIONAL STUDIES (BMOS) HONORS DEGREE

The essential modules in the 20.0 course Bachelor of Management and Organizational Studies (BMOS) HONORS DEGREE must include either an HONORS SPECIALIZATION OR DOUBLE MAJOR. The Honors Double Major must include one of the five Majors in combination with another Major module from ***a discipline other than Management and Organizational Studies.***

HONORS SPECIALIZATIONS

Enrolment in the BMOS Honors Specialization modules is limited. Meeting of minimal requirements does not guarantee admission.

The four-year BMOS WITH HONORS SPECIALIZATION must include one of the following five Honors Specialization modules:

ACCOUNTING
CONSUMER BEHAVIOR
FINANCE FOR MANAGEMENT AND ORGANIZATIONAL STUDIES (MOS)
HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT
COMMERCIAL AVIATION MANAGEMENT

Admission Requirements

Students may **not** apply to a BMOS HONORS SPECIALIZATION when they apply for admission to the University.

After first year, students may apply for admission upon completion of first-year requirements with no failures. Students must have an average of at least 73% on, and no grade less than 60% in, the following 3.0 principal courses:

1.0 course: MOS 1021A/B and 1023A/B

1.0 course from: Calculus 1000 A/B, 1100A/B, 1301A/B, 1501A/B; Mathematics 1225A/B, 1228A/B, 1229A/B, 1600A/B*

1.0 course: numbered 1000-1999 (Economics 1021 A/B and 1022A/B will be counted towards the Admission Requirements in lieu of 1.0 course numbered 1000 -1999 for the Honors Specialization in Finance for MOS.)

Note: *Students admitted without Calculus should be aware that to enrol in certain

courses/modules they may be required to take Mathematics 0110 A/B or Calculus 1100A/B. When considering a course/module in another discipline, please check the Mathematics requirements(s). Students are responsible for ensuring they have completed the Mathematics and other entry requirements and prerequisites of the modules/courses they wish to take.

After first year, students may apply for admission to the COMMERCIAL AVIATION MANAGEMENT HONORS SPECIALIZATION upon completion of first-year requirements with no failures. Students must have an average of at least 73% on, and no grade less than 60% in, any of the 3.0 principal courses:

1.0 course: MOS 1021A/B and 1023A/B

0.5 course: MOS 1022F/G

1.0 course from: Calculus 1000A/B, 1100A/B, 1301A/B, 1501A/B; Mathematics 1225A/B, 1228A/B, 1229A/B, 1600A/B*

0.5 course: numbered 1000-1999

Note: *Students admitted without Calculus should be aware that to enrol in certain courses/modules they may be required to take Mathematics 0110 A/B or Calculus 1100A/B. When considering a course/module in another discipline, please check the Mathematics requirements(s). Students are responsible for ensuring they have completed the Mathematics and other entry requirements and prerequisites of the modules/courses they wish to take. Students who fail to meet these admission requirements may be eligible to apply to a BMOS Specialization or to another program.

After second year, students applying for a BMOS HONORS SPECIALIZATION must have

- a) achieved an average of at least 73% on the last 5.0 courses;
- b) achieved an average of 73% on the 3.0 principle courses required for the module;
- c) obtained a minimum grade of 60% in each course required for the module;
- d) obtained a passing grade in each elective course;
- e) a minimum cumulative average of 65%.

Progression Requirements

To *remain* in a BMOS HONORS SPECIALIZATION, students must have

- a) maintained a cumulative modular average of 70%;
- b) obtained a minimum grade of 60% in each course required for the module;
- c) obtained a passing grade in each elective course;
- d) maintained a cumulative average of 65%

Students who fail to meet these progression requirements may be eligible to apply to a BMOS Specialization or to another program.

Graduation Requirements

To graduate from a BMOS HONORS SPECIALIZATION, students must achieve a minimum cumulative modular average of 70% with a minimum mark of 60% in each course, obtain a passing grade in each elective course, and maintain a minimum overall average of 65% on the 20.0 courses counted towards the BMOS HONORS SPECIALIZATION Degree. Students with advanced standing must achieve an overall average of 65% on courses completed at Western. All students require 2.0 designated essay courses (E, F or G; at least 1.0 of which must be a senior course numbered 2000-4999) and 1.0 course from each of the Categories A, B and C.

Notes: *Students who have completed Economics 2150 A/B, 2151A/B, and 2152A/B with an average of 80% and no mark less than 75%, and who have taken Calculus 1000A/B or Calculus 1100A/B with a mark of at least 60%, may enter the Honors Specialization in Finance for MOS and be exempt from taking Economics 2220A/B, 2260A/B and 2261A/B. Students who have completed these requirements and have also completed Economics 2122A/B and 2123A/B with an average of 80% and no mark less than 75% may also be exempt from taking Economics 2222A/B and 2223A/B.

**Students interested in pursuing an HBA Degree at the Richard Ivey School of Business must defer MOS 2310A/B and 2320A/B until Year 3. These two courses will not count towards the 10.0 credits required for admission to the HBA Program and are discouraged for those students continuing on to the Richard Ivey School of Business. Students continuing in MOS must complete MOS 2310A/B and 2320A/B in Year 3 prior to enrolling in MOS courses for which these courses are the prerequisite.

Background:

These curriculum changes to the MOS Program are necessary in order to implement the new Strategic Plan for MOS. This plan emphasizes the need to differentiate the MOS Program from conventional business schools and to reinforce the social science foundations of MOS by rebranding the program as an Evidence-Based Management orientation to business education, focused on specific functional areas with strong links to the social sciences. These proposals provide the means to implement the Strategic Plan through a new structure and curriculum that is consistent with the academic plans of the Faculty of Social Science and Western.

9. Brescia University College: Revised Sociology Modules and Certificate Program

Recommended: That effective September 1, 2011, the admission requirement for the following Sociology modules and Certificate program be revised to include a requirement of completion of a Community Development application by a specific deadline and the stipulation of limited enrolment.

Admission Requirements

Effective September 1, 2011, to register in this module students are required to submit a Community Development application form by April 15 before the beginning of the student's third year. Enrolment in this module is limited. Meeting the minimum requirements does not guarantee that students wishing to transfer into this module will be offered enrolment. Priority will be given to students already registered at Brescia.

CERTIFICATE IN COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

Admission Requirements

The Certificate in Community Development is offered through the Department of Sociology and Brescia University College. Students in professional programs may pursue the Certificate concurrently with their degree program. All Community Development courses may count towards the student's undergraduate program. This program is comprised of required courses, including a practicum course, equivalent to three courses, and two optional courses to be selected from an approved interdisciplinary list.

To be admitted into the Certificate in Community Development, the student is required to complete and submit a Community Development application form by April 15 before the beginning of the program. Enrolment in this program is limited. Meeting the minimum requirements does not guarantee that applicants will be admitted. Priority will be given to students already registered at Brescia.

Background:

These revisions will provide an opportunity to carefully assess candidates who will be involved in placements connected to Brescia's community service learning courses. Setting a deadline for applications enables a more efficient application processing. Due to the intensive nature of service learning courses, enrolment needs to be limited to ensure competent supervision.

10. **Faculty of Health Sciences and Faculty of Music: Transfer of Dance Courses from Kinesiology to Music**

Effective September 1, 2010, administration of the Dance courses currently offered by the School of Kinesiology, Faculty of Health Sciences, will be transferred to the Faculty of Music. Details of the proposed transfer are set out below.

Background:

At Western, credit courses in Dance have been offered as a component of the Physical Education program and viewed as one of a number of activities courses that could be elected by Phys Ed (now Kinesiology) majors. With a shift in emphasis in the Kinesiology program towards a medicine/exercise focus, Dance courses have become more peripheral and perhaps less effective as a "modality" option in the program. Indeed, the issue of Dance as an art form does not factor in to the program's needs in any way.

At the same time, Western has a strong reputation for quality Dance activities in general. (This would include Dance courses offered through Continuing Studies and programs supported by various student

Dance Clubs.) As well, the Dance courses attract students from a wide range of programs across campus in addition to Kinesiology majors. In the broader community, studios attract thousands of students each year to programs in all types of Dance, and this trend in popularity is on the increase. Many graduates of these studios wish to continue with Dance activities while attending university.

Dance is also recognized by Ontario's Ministry of Education as a teaching subject. Curriculum guidelines are available for Dance courses through to Grade 12, including a Grade 12 University/College Preparation level course. (See attached for a sample of secondary schools in Ontario offering dance courses.) At the moment, only one Faculty of Education in Ontario (York) offers Dance as a teaching subject option in the Bachelor of Education program.

The current array of courses in Dance include introductory courses, general movement making, specific dance types (modern, jazz, ballet), and also courses in dance composition and production (practical and theoretical understanding of performance and production, including rehearsal, presentation, and analysis of complete works).

Some possible advantages of moving Dance to Music in the manner proposed include the following:

- Retaining the "Dance" title would allow Music majors to take Dance courses to fulfill non-Music program requirements. Dance would not be competing with Music electives.
- Kinesiology has used the Dance courses to fulfill physical activity program requirements, largely ignoring artistic considerations. The proposed linkage with Music could support an emphasis on Dance as an art form, thus likely enhancing Western's overall profile in the Arts.
- Recent developments related to the graduate program in Musical Theatre have involved new course work in movement and dance, and the benefits to all of our stage activities has been very positive.
- On average, roughly 25% of the registrants in the Dance courses are Kinesiology majors. The other students major in a wide range of areas and disciplines, meaning that Music would be connecting with programs across campus.
- Instructional costs for the Dance courses would not require funding from the Faculty's operating budget and in fact would yield a modest increase in funding for Music.
- Obviously, taking on administrative responsibility for the Dance courses means that Music would control any future development in the area. This control ranges from the number and type of courses to be offered each year (NOTE: Since there are no "Dance Majors," there are, at present, no required courses which must be offered), through to the development of a Dance program which we may wish to undertake.

Facilities

The Dance Studio in Alumni Hall is still serviceable and can meet the immediate needs of Dance courses as proposed above. The room is equipped with a sprung wooden floor, mirrors, and drapes.

11. Faculty of Law: Suspension of Admission to JD (UWO)/LLM (Auckland) Combined Program

Effective September 1, 2010, admission to the JD (UWO)/LLM (Auckland) Combined Program in the Faculty of Law will be suspended.

Background:

Due to changes in the admission requirements to their LLM program, the Faculty of Law, University of Auckland, has requested that admission to the current JD/LLM Combined Program be suspended. There are no students currently enrolled in the program.

12. New Scholarships and Awards

SCAPA has approved on behalf of the Senate the following Terms of Reference for the following new scholarships, for recommendation to the Board of Governors through the President & Vice-Chancellor:

Sandra Oosterhoff Memorial Bursary (Faculty of Law)

Awarded annually to a full-time student registered in any year in the Faculty of Law based on financial need. Online financial need applications are available through the Registrar's Web site and must be

submitted by October 31. The Office of the Registrar will select the recipient. This bursary was established in memory of Sandra Oosterhoff (BA'61, LLB'64), whose character and courage in the face of adversity inspired those who knew her. Reflecting her generosity and concern for others, this bursary was created through Foundation Western by friends, family, classmates and faculty colleagues of her husband, Albert Oosterhoff.

Value: 1 at \$800
Effective: 2010-2011 academic year

This award is offered through the Ontario Student Opportunity Trust Fund (OSOTF) program, and recipients must meet Ontario residency requirements.

Allen K. Philbrick PhD Scholarship in Cultural Geography (School of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies, Geography)

Awarded to a full-time PhD student in good standing who is studying Cultural Geography, based on academic achievement. To be eligible, a student must be in Years 2 to 4 of a PhD program and be undertaking research on some cultural process or cultural phenomena's spatial impact on the human environment. Candidates can obtain an application through the Graduate Affairs Committee in the Department of Geography by presenting their research prospectus. A committee in the Department of Geography, with at least one representative who is a current member of the School of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies, will select the recipient. Award recipients are eligible to receive this scholarship more than once throughout their academic career at Western. This award was established through Foundation Western.

Value: 1 at \$1,000
Effective: May 2010

Vladimir Stritesky Engineering Award (Faculty of Engineering)

Awarded annually to a full-time undergraduate student in any engineering program who has a minimum 70% average and demonstrated financial need. Preference will be given to a student who has immigrated to Canada. Students must submit a one-page statement describing why they are pursuing engineering and how this award will assist them financially, along with a copy of their proof of immigration to Canada, to the Undergraduate Engineering Office by September 30. Online financial need applications are available on the Office of the Registrar's Web site and must be submitted by September 30. The scholarship committee in the Faculty of Engineering will select the recipient after the Registrar's Office assesses financial need. This award was established through Foundation Western by Mr. Vladimir Stritesky (BESc'76).

Value: 1 at \$500
Effective Date: 2010-2011 academic year only (value to be reviewed for 2011-2012)

Brian Innes Health Studies Rural Health Award (Faculty of Health Sciences, Health Studies)

Awarded annually to an undergraduate student in the School of Health Studies, with preference given to a student who has excelled in the third-year rural health courses, Health Sciences 3010F/G (Introduction to Rural Communities) and/or 3400a/b (Health Policy). A one-page statement outlining the student's interest in rural health/rural health policy must accompany the application. Applications are available through the School of Health Studies and are due in the Director's Office by October 30. The Scholarship and Awards Committee in the School of Health Studies will select the recipient based on academic achievement in the above courses, career aspirations which include rural health and/or policy goals, and experience. This award was established through Foundation Western by family and friends in memory of Brian Innes who was a faculty member in the School of Health Studies.

Value: 1 at \$1,000
Effective: 2010-2011 academic year

Severin Flikerski Prize in Military History (Faculty of Social Science, History)

Awarded annually to the undergraduate student in the Department of History who submits the best essay in military history. Preference will be given for topics in European military history. Students must submit a graded copy of an essay written in the last twelve months (3,000 word minimum) to the History

Department by April 10. The History Department will promote the prize with the appropriate professors and students. A committee within the Department of History will select the student recipient. This prize was established by Professor Maya Shatzmiller in memory of her late husband, Mr. Severin Flikerski.

Value: 1 at \$150
Effective: 2010-2011 to 2014-2015 academic years

Joel Fried Scholarship in Economics (Faculty of Social Science, Economics)

Awarded annually to a full-time undergraduate student entering third or fourth year in an Honors Specialization or Major in Economics, based on high academic achievement in the previous year (minimum 80% average). The student must have completed at least 0.5 course in Monetary Economics or Financial Economics. The scholarship and awards committee in the Faculty of Social Science will select the recipient. This scholarship was established by memorial donations received in memory of Joel Fried, a Professor Emeritus in Economics, and a bequest through Foundation Western by Christopher James Grimes (BA Honors Economics '55).

Value: 1 at \$1,400
Effective: 2010-2011 academic year

Dr. D.S.M. Haines Gold Medal and Book Prize (Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry, Clinical Biochemistry)

Awarded annually to a n outstanding student graduating with the highest average from the Clinical Biochemistry Honors Specialization Program. The recipient will be selected by the Progression and Awards Committee within the Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry. This Gold Medal and Book Prize were established by donations made in memory of Dr. Haines, Professor & former Chair of the Division of Clinical Biochemistry, and Chief of Biochemistry, London Health Sciences Centre.

Value: 1 Gold Medal (Standardized Medal Cost of \$100) and Book Prize of \$200 (to be awarded as a gift certificate, UWO Book Store)
Effective: 2010-2011 to 2017-2018 academic years inclusive

Robert and Ruth Keilty Award in Management and Organizational Studies (Faculty of Social Science, MOS)

Awarded annually to a full-time student enrolled in third year of any module of the Management and Organizational Studies Program (MOS), based upon academic achievement in MOS the previous year, and demonstrated financial need. Online financial need applications can be accessed through the Registrar's Web site and must be submitted by October 31. The scholarship/awards committee within MOS will select the recipient after the Registrar's Office has assessed financial need. This award was established by a generous donation from Robert Keilty (BA'84) and Ruth Keilty.

Value: 1 at \$1,500
Effective: 2010-2011 to 2014-2015 academic years only

Men's Basketball Futures Scholarships (Any Undergraduate, Graduate or Affiliated University College Student-Athletic Award [Basketball])

Awarded to full-time undergraduate and graduate students in any year of any degree program at Western, including the Affiliated University Colleges, who are making significant contributions as members of the Men's Basketball Team. As per OUA and CIS regulations, an entering student athlete must have a minimum admission average of 80% and a non-entering student must have an in-course average of 70%. Candidates must be in compliance with current OUA and CIS regulations. The Western Athletic Financial Awards Committee will select the recipients based on its evaluation of academic performance/potential (20%), and the written recommendations from the Head Coach assessing athletic performance/potential and team/campus leadership (weighted as 60% and 20% respectively). These scholarships were established by Peter Schmidt (BA '95), Jonathan Dingle (BSc '97) and Doug Morton (BA '69).

Value: 1 at \$3,500 and 1 at \$1,000
Effective: 2010-2011 to 2014-2015 academic years inclusive

Gudaitis-Bluzas Health Sector Scholarship (School of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies, MBA)

Awarded to a full-time student entering the Masters in Business Administration program at the Richard Ivey School of Business who is enrolled in the Health Sector Stream, based on academic achievement and demonstrated community leadership. The MBA Scholarship Committee of the Richard Ivey School of Business will review each candidate and select the recipient in consultation with the School of Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies. This scholarship is made possible by a generous gift from Edward Gudaitis, MBA '93.

Value: 1 at \$10,000
Effective: May 2011 to April 2014
