The funding from the IDI will go towards four main goals; consolidating a Centre of Excellence at Western in the area of climate change, health and sustainable food systems; generating climate change knowledge to improve resource governance in Africa; working with local partners to train men and women farmers on climate change impacts and responses; and generating research ideas for large scale projects relating to climate change, health and sustainable food systems.

Reflections from our April African Conversation Series on Education

Our winter term work study students, Emily Sullo (GHS) and Nirekah Suthakar (Health Sciences), had the chance to write a great reflection on our April African Conversation Series, titled "Education as a Social and Economic Game Changer". This panel featured Dr. Teresiah Wambui Gathenya, PhD, Senior Education Advisor at USAID Monrovia, Libera, and two youths, Hannah Nungari Ndungu and Daniel Mwangi. Here is what our work study students wrote:

On April 22nd, the African Institute presented the African Conversation Series: Education as a Social and Economic Development Game Changer, moderated by Immaculate Namukasa. Dr. Teresiah Wambui Gathenya, the Senior Education Advisor with USAID in Liberia, presented a narrative explaining the importance of investing in education for all through the stories of two youth, Daniel Mwagi and Hannah Nungari Ndungu. Dr. Gathenya believes giving a child an opportunity to access quality education can transform their lives and the lives of those around them. She has been the mentor to both Daniel Mwagi and Hannah Nungari Ndungu in assisting them to obtain their schooling and other opportunities.

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Hannah Nungari Ndungu was brought up by her grandparents in Kenya after the loss of her mother and was one of the top students at her local primary school. However, she was close to dropping out of her primary school due to a lack of resources. This was changed when she met Dr. Gathenya, who connected Hannah Nungari to schooling services and scholarships that she could access to further her studies. With the support of Dr. Gathenya, Hannah Nungari completed her Bachelor's of Sociology and Psychology at the University of Nairobi. She is currently working with the Kiambu County government as a secretary and a board member of her past primary school. She sponsors students in their academics and well-being and supports the less privileged members of society. She firmly believes that education is the primary cause for her growth in academics and well-being. She ended her motivating narrative by sharing some of the lessons she learned through her life experiences in helping to inspire others.

Daniel Mwangi was left to grow up living on the streets after his mother left, as he had no connection to his father. Throughout his time living on the streets, Danial experienced a number of hardships, including Malaria, and struggled to produce enough money for himself. However, he was introduced to Dr. Gathenya in his teens and was provided with the opportunity to attend

school. Danial worked his way through secondary school and attended the Kenya Power Training Institute for a diploma in electrical engineering. He has since earned his diploma and continues to give to others through his church, schools, and the local rehabilitation centre. He shares his story with youth in hopes of being a mentor for them and aims to empower them to achieve their own goals.

Dr. Gathenya, Hannah, and Daniel emphasized that education played a pivotal role in redirecting their lives and leading them from harmful circumstances. Hannah specified that without the opportunity to continue her education, she would have continued to live in poverty and may have ended up living in the streets. On the other hand, Daniel recognized that he would most likely have died if he continued to live on the streets, as many of his friends did after he left. However, these impacts have extended beyond Daniel and Hannah to their families and communities, as they now work to create change within the lives of those around them through the positions they hold and their actions. By inciting change by offering what little they have to others, Hannah and Daniel produce a ripple effect through others. By supporting one person, who then goes to support another, their successes can be replicated throughout communities, the country, and the world.
