# Written assignment

For 15% of the course grade, you are to write a research update paper in the style of the American Journal of Medical Genetics. Further details will be posted to the OWL site. The assignment is due on December 1<sup>st</sup>. A penalty will be assessed for late submissions.

## **Accommodated Evaluations**
