## 3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

**Course Description**: This course [Biology 3594b] will cover concepts related to DNA organization, replication, mutagenesis and repair in both prokaryotic and eukaryotic organisms. Lecture topics will include current literature in DNA mutagenesis and repair designed to permit direct examination of concepts, experimental design, methodology, data analysis and future trends.

### Learning Outcomes and Objectives:

On successful completion of this course students will be able to:

Assess the characteristics of bio-indicator species.

Describe measures of cyto-genotoxicity.

Distinguish between sources of environmental DNA and their use in DNA barcoding and metabarcoding.

Explain the effects of alcohol on DNA and the body.

Demonstrate an understanding of mutation signatures and how particular signatures are created.

Contrast episodic mutation acquisition to more gradual acquisition.

Describe hypermutation and the role of DNA repair.

Contrast the mutation spectra of different organisms.

Describe and illustrate a diagram for common methods for DNA damage assays, mutation detection assays and gene/genome sequence analysis techniques

Assemble a mutation report.
