Biology 3436F/G or Psychology 3221F/G and either completion of at least 1.5 Biology courses from the 3000 level or above, or registration in year 4 of the Honours Specialization in Animal Behaviour.

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean's Designate (Department or Science Academic Advisors) to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

### 3. Course Description, Learning Outcomes, Schedule, Delivery Mode

**Course Description:** A study of the relationships between animal behavior, ecology and evolution. Topics will include evolution, optimization theory, survival strategies, game theory, reproductive strategies, and social behaviour.

### **Learning Outcomes and Objectives:**

By the end of this course you should be able to:

- 1. Engage in meaningful discussion about behavioural ecology and how it relates to ecology, evolution, and behaviour.
- 2. Recall and explain the main behavioural ecology theories that are covered.
- 3. Critically evaluate text in the context of behavioural ecology theories.
- 4. Independently collect and synthesize information on a topic in the field of behavioural ecology.
- 5. Communicate scientific knowledge in written and oral forms.

Contingency Plan: This course will be delivered in-person, however in the unlikely event of any university-declared emergency, some or all of this course may be required to be delivered online, either synchronously or asynchronously. The grading scheme will not change. Any assessments affected will be conducted online as determined by the professor.

### 5. Methods of Evaluation

## The overall course grade will be calculated as:

- 5% Crayfish Lab write-up (due February 7, 4:30 pm) Midterm test (February 12, 9:30-10:20) 15%
- 10% Project presentation – draft (due March 20, 11:59 pm)
- 10% Project presentation – final (scheduled between March 27-Apr 3)
- Project write-up (due April 4, 2024, 4:30 pm) 25%
- 35% Final exam (date TBA)

Extra: SimBio assignments (2% per section x 7 sections = 14%). These credits can be used to boost the 35% allocation. I will assign the higher of your final exam alone (35%) **OR** your final exam (21%) + SimBio (14%).

The final exam will be in person. The exam is cumulative will cover all lecture content.

A passing grade on the lab components (summing to 50% of course grade) is required to pass the course. If a passing grade is not met, the maximum course grade will be 45%.

Written assignments will be submitted to Turnitin (statement in policies below)
Students will have 1 submission to Turnitin
Rubrics will be used to evaluate assessments and will be posted with the instructions
After an assessment is returned, students should wait 24 hours to digest feedback before
contacting their evaluator

All requests for Academic Consideration must be made within 48 hours after the assessment date or submission deadline, using the Student Absence Portal.

All Academic Consideration requests normally must include supporting documentation; however, recognizing that formal documentation may not be available in some extenuating circumstances, the policy allows students to make one Academic Consideration request without supporting documentation in this course. However, the following assessments are excluded from this, and therefore always require formal supporting documentation:

- The Project Presentation (final)
- The final exam

When a student mistakenly submits their one allowed Academic Consideration request without supporting documentation for the assessments listed above or those in the Coursework with Assessment Flexibility section below, the request cannot be recalled and reapplied. This privilege is forfeited.

Deadlines are fixed, but some have flexibility. Late penalties (1% of course grade per 24 h) will accrue immediately after a deadline. Deadlines to complete the Crayfish Lab write-up and Project Presentation (draft) will be subject to a 48h grace period when accrued late penalties will not be deducted. The Project write-up will be subject to a 72h grace period when accrued late penalties will not be deducted. For example, if you hand in the Crayfish Lab write-up 40 h after the deadline, a 2% late penalty will have accrued but this late penalty will not be applied. If you hand in your Crayfish Lab write-up 50 h after the deadline, a 3% late penalty will have accrued and this late penalty will be applied (i.e., the maximum grade you can achieve on this assignment will be 2/5).

When a student misses the Final Exam and their Academic Consideration has been granted, they will be allowed to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam). See the Academic Calendar for details (under Special Examinations), especially for those who miss multiple final exams within one examination period.

**Note:** missed work can *only* be excused through one of the mechanisms above. Being asked not to attend an in-person course requirement due to potential COVID-19 symptoms is **not** sufficient on its own.
