# 3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

This course provides a solid and insightful introduction to the field of animal behaviour, as conceptualized through an integrative framework and encourages a fundamental understanding of the relationship between genotypes, behavioural phenotypes, and the living environment. From these fundamentals, our goal is to gain competence generating and testing evolutionary-minded hypotheses that potentially explain the ultimate function of behaviour variation, while integrating ecological, mechanistic, and developmental approaches to the study of behaviour.

Lectures may blend from one to the next, and it is a good idea to strive to make connections between lecture topics. The lecture content is grounded by a series of labs that require you to assemble and analyse data, generate and test hypotheses using basic statistics, and interpret your results and present them in lab reports.

### **Course-Level Learning Outcomes:**

As a results of attending lectures, students should be able to:

- 1. Understand how natural selection works and be able to explain this process.
- 2. Identify fitness consequences as they apply to focal individuals and their associates.
- 3. Recognize the potential for evolutionary trade-offs and conflicts, as well as the potential for multi-individual cooperation.
- 4. Appreciate the broader environmental and social context of behavioural networks.
- 5. Recognize short and long-term fitness profiles, reproductive costs and benefits, immediate and delayed fitness returns, as well as direct and indirect fitness effects.
- 6. Conceptualize evolutionary processes above and below the level of the individual.
- 7. Relate theory-based animal behaviour to human culture.

As a results of participating in hands-on laboratory activities, students should be able to:

- 1. Recognize and measure natural variation in behavioural traits.
- 2. Generate and manage community data using spreadsheets.
- 3. Choose and perform statistical analyses appropriate to the data at hand.
- 4. Present and interpret results in written form using support from primary literature.

All Academic Consideration requests must include supporting documentation; however, recognizing that formal documentation may not be available in some extenuating circumstances, the policy allows students to make <u>one</u> Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** in this course. However, the following assessments are excluded from this, and therefore always require formal supporting documentation:

- Final examinations scheduled during official examination periods (Defined by policy)
- Midterm examination (Designated by the instructor as the <u>one</u> assessment that always requires documentation when requesting Academic Consideration)

When a student <u>mistakenly</u> submits their <u>one</u> allowed Academic Consideration request **without supporting documentation** for the assessments listed above or those in the **Coursework with Assessment Flexibility** section below, <u>the request cannot be recalled and reapplied</u>. This privilege is forfeited.

#### **Evaluation Scheme for Missed Assessments**

**Midterm:** Missing the midterm exam requires formal supporting documentation. If a student misses the midterm, including conflicts with another midterm, then the student will write the make-up midterm on October 10<sup>th</sup> at 7-9pm. If the student is unable to write either midterm test, then the midterm will be reweighted to the final exam.

Lab performance: If a student absence from a data collection lab is accommodated via academic consideration, the 2% attributed to that lab will be reweighted to the accompanying lab report. They will be provided with their section's data to complete the lab report analysis and write-up. If a student misses a data observation lab without accommodation, they forfeit the 2% attributed to that lab. Students may only attend data collection labs for their section – they may not attend another lab in lieu of missing their own.

Lab reports: If a student fails to submit a lab report, they will be assigned a zero for that report. Each lab report is granted a 48-hour period after the deadline with no late penalty. If the student is unable to submit the lab within this period, they require academic consideration to accommodate a late submission. Students who submit academic consideration without documentation must submit their report within 72 hours of the original deadline. Academic consideration requests without documentation will be denied for extensions beyond 72 hours beyond the original deadline. In this case, students must request academic consideration with documentation to the Academic Advising portal. If an extended deadline is supported, the student must submit their lab report within 24 hours of the end of their extension period. Late lab reports cannot be submitted after grades/feedback have been returned to any lab section in any case. If academic consideration is granted and the lab reported cannot be completed at all, the weight of the lab report will be distributed to the other two reports.

**Final Exam:** Accommodation for the final exam as scheduled by the OOR always requires formal supporting documentation. Students who miss the final exam and are granted academic consideration will write the department scheduled makeup final exam. When a student misses both the Final Exam and make-up Final, and their Academic Consideration has been granted, they will be allowed to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam). See the Academic Calendar for details (under <u>Special Examinations</u>), especially for those who miss multiple final exams within one examination period.

### **Essential Learning Requirements**

Even when Academic Considerations are granted for missed coursework, the following are deemed essential to earn a passing grade.

• a minimum number of two submitted lab reports

In such cases that a student fails to complete and submit at least two of three lab reports and has been granted formal academic consideration, they may complete the remaining lab(s) in the next offering of the course. In this case, they will receive a grade of Incomplete (INC) and their maximum course lad may be reduced during the term in which they complete their course requirements.

#### **Coursework with Assessment Flexibility**

By policy, instructors may deny Academic Consideration requests for the following assessments with built-in flexibility:

**Deadline with a No-Late-Penalty Period Assignments.** Students are expected to submit each of the three lab reports by their respective deadlines. Should extenuating circumstances arise, students do not need to request Academic Consideration and they are permitted to submit their lab reports up to 48 hours past the deadline without a late penalty. Should students submit their assessment beyond 48 hours past the deadline without accommodation, a 10% deduction will apply at the end of the 48 hours period, with an additional 10% per day. Academic Consideration requests may be granted only for extenuating circumstances that started before the deadline and lasted longer than the No-Late-Penalty Period (48 hours).

• For example: If your lab report is due on Monday, October 7th at 2:30pm, then you have until Wednesday, October 9th at 2:30pm to submit with no-late penalty. If you require accommodation for an extension, you must submit for academic consideration. If you submit without documentation, you have until Thursday, October 10th at 2:30pm to submit your lab. If you submit with documentation and are granted accommodation until Monday, October 14th, you must submit by end of day October 15th. If you do not submit for, or receive, approved academic accommodation and submit your report on Friday October 11th at 4pm, you will receive a 20% deduction (day 1: Thursday after 2:30, day 2: Friday after 2:30).
