COURSE DESCRIPTION:

In this class we will explore athletics and spectacles in Ancient Greece and Rome. We will focus primarily on the ancient Olympics, gladiators, and chariot races, but also such topics as gender and sport, ancient sports medicine, and the business side of athletics and spectacles. In so doing, we will analyze closely the ancient sources closely: archaeology, art, literature, law, business contracts, and more., and secondary scholarship in order to reconstruct the historical practices and ideologies involved with ancient sports.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

On successful completion of this course students are expected to be able to:

- understand ancient Greek and Roman athletic and sport activities
- appreciate the role of athletics and spectacles in Greek and Roman society
- identify artistic imagery and subject matter and be able to visually analyze them
- interpret the ancient literary sources
- understand the importance and limitations of archaeological evidence
