GREEK POETRY SELECTIONS

COURSE DESCRIPTION AND GOALS

In this half-course students will read Book 6 of Homer's *Iliad* in the original Greek and consolidate their understanding of Ancient Greek grammar and syntax. Students will also be introduced to the basic stages of transmission of an ancient text and to the use of a critical edition, and gain familiarity with the most commonly used metrical forms and their role in Greek epic. Topics discussed will include the formal aspects of Greek poetic art and literary interpretation, as well as the nature of Homeric language and oral theory.

LEARNING OBJECTIVES

On successful completion of this course students are expected to:

- have developed the advanced language skills necessary to read a poetic text from in the original Greek;
- have acquired a basic understanding of the transmission of an ancient Greek text and the ability to use an *apparatus criticus* effectively;
- be able to scan basic Greek metres;
- -be able to identify the formal features of an ancient Greek poetic text;
- have gained an insight into the intellectual and religious world of early epic;

LEARNING OUTCOMES / TRANSFERABLE SKILLS

Students completing this course are expected to have acquired:

- a confident understanding of general narrative and artistic principles that can be applied to other forms of narrative literature;
- a basic familiarity with mythological archetypes useful in understanding recurrent themes in Western culture;
- a basic skill in relating specific performance forms and general cultural contexts that will be valuable in understanding all artistic creations.
