COURSE TIME, LOCATION, INSTRUCTOR, & TAS: Posted on OWL.

PREREQUISITE/ANTIREQUISITE: There is no prerequisite or antirequisite for this course.

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course will introduce students to Greek and Roman civilization, focusing on art, and philosophy. As students examine both literary and archeological evidence, they will also become familiar with the cultural and social life of the Greeks and Romans.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

On successful completion of this course students will:

- acquire a knowledge of both political and social history
- identify both the imagery and subject matter of ancient art
- critique social norms as a product of time and events

METHOD OF EVALUATION (all tests are multiple-choice)

Midterm 2 (in the December exam period, as scheduled by the registrar)	20%
Midterm 3 (February 11, in class)	25%
Final Exam (in the April exam period, as scheduled by the registrar)	40%

- The makeups for the midterms will be held one week after the regular test, on Thursday at 7:00 pm. The format of the makeup may be differnt than the original midterm (that is, essays and short answers).
- The makeup for the final exam will be held on Thursday May 8th at 6:00 pm.
