

Earth Sciences Field Camp (ES2250Y) – 2020 Course Outline

Instructors

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Corequisite

Earth Sciences 2200A/B and registration in a module or program where Earth Sciences 2250Y is mandatory; or registration in an Earth Sciences Minor and a minimum mark of 60% in Earth Sciences 2200A/B.

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Academic Counselor to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

Course Format and Marking Scheme

This course takes place from **May 1-11** near the towns of Espanola, Elliot Lake, Little Current, and the City of Sudbury. If a student misses the departure of the vans, fails to be present for any of the days of instruction (including the departure and return days), or fails to participate, marks will be deducted from the student's final grade. The amount deducted will be determined by the course instructor(s) but could range up to 10% per day.

Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Draft a detailed stratigraphic section through clastic or carbonate strata;
- Measure cross-beds in ancient rocks using a geological compass;
- Traverse through the bush using a compass and pacing;
- Identify key sedimentary, igneous and metamorphic rock types in the field;
- Draft a geological map using satellite imagery and GPS;
- Determine lithological contacts using a field portable magnetometer
