### 3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

This course is an eleven-day field camp that takes place from **May 1-11** near the towns of Espanola, Elliot Lake, Little Current, and the City of Sudbury. Students will be conducting field/course work every day. If a student misses the departure of the vans, fails to be present for any of the days of instruction (including the departure and return days), or fails to participate, marks will be deducted from the student's final grade. The amount deducted will be determined by the course instructor(s).

## Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Draft a detailed stratigraphic section through clastic and/or carbonate strata;
- Measure bedding and cross-bedding in ancient rocks using a geological compass;
- Traverse through the bush using a compass and pacing;
- Identify key sedimentary, igneous and metamorphic rock types in the field;
- Create a geological map using satellite imagery and GPS

Field and/or course work will take place every day between May 1 and 11. Most days, the course will run between 9 am and 5 pm but some days may start earlier (8 am) or run later (6 pm), or there may be an evening assignment after 6 pm. Specific times may be altered depending on weather conditions.

## 4. Course Materials

Students may check the course OWL site (<https://westernu.brightspace.com/>) on a regular basis for news and updates. Students will also be given instructions each morning and each evening in person.

A detailed list of required materials (including clothing) for the course will be provided on the OWL site by the end of March. No textbooks or advanced readings are required for the course, but every student must attend a field safety meeting, which will take place prior to the end of March.

Partial cost of the field expenses must be borne by the student, and it is payable to the Department by the February deadline. The cost per student is \$475 in 2025-2026. Fees are non-refundable in the event of a course drop, except in extenuating circumstances.

## 5. Methods of Evaluation

### Grading Scheme

The overall course grade will be calculated as listed below:

Assignments (3; stratigraphic section, paleocurrent analysis, geological traverse)	15%
Quizzes (3; following trips to Sudbury, Elliot Lake, Manitoulin Island or Whitefish Falls)	15%
Maps (2; due May 10 <sup>th</sup> , includes field notes)	30%
Participation (based on engagement throughout the period of May 1-11)	10%
Final exam (May 9th, theory and rock identification, done on site)	30%

### **Evaluation Scheme for Missed Assessments**

The instructors will not grant extensions for missed assignments unless a valid medical reason has been provided. In such a case, the student will either have a grade make-up opportunity or the other grades will be reweighted.

### **Absences from Final Examinations**

When a student misses the Final Exam and their Academic Consideration has been granted, they will be allowed to write the Special Examination (the name given by the University to a makeup Final Exam). ### **Essential Learning Requirements**

All assignments, maps, and the final exam must be completed to pass the course.

### **Flexible Completion**

This course has 3 quizzes. Should extenuating circumstances arise, students do not need to request Academic Consideration for 1 missed quiz. Academic consideration requests will be denied if students miss the other 2 quizzes.

## **6. Additional Statements**

### **6.1 Religious Accommodation**

If no such permission is granted, students must assume that use is prohibited. It is your responsibility to seek clarification before using any AI tools in academic work.
