### 3. Course Syllabus, Schedule, Delivery Mode

A foundational field and in-class course exposing students to the interdisciplinary aspects of environmental science by studying various off-campus sites throughout the term. Students will gain hands-on and team-based learning skills by investigating the problems, processes, and results of humankind's impacts on natural systems.

#### Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- Explain how natural and anthropogenic elements interconnect to cause environmental issues, such as climate change, pollutants, habitat destruction, and soil degradation.

- Understand the natural processes operating in Earth's ecosystems through direct immersion in the environment.
- Apply hands-on, interdisciplinary and collaborative practices to identify and monitor current environmental problems and solutions.
- Critically evaluate local environmental issues and applications using data analysis.
- Collaborate effectively with stakeholders, including companies, government officials, not-for-profit organizations, First Nations communities, and the general public, to motivate change.

### Field Trip Topics

The following trips are examples of what may be offered each year; these are subject to change.

- Investigating waste separation, diversion, re-use, and burial
- From fossil fuels to plastics: Petrolia and Sarnia's chemical valley
- Tour of wastewater treatment facility
- Upper Thames Conservation Authority threatened species and river water quality
- Indigenous views of the environment and implemented programs
- Sustainable tomato growing
- Pelee Island Winery sustainable practices and terroir
- Pinery Park biodiversity, deposits, protection, and erosion

### Classes (One session = 1 hour)

Advanced preparation for, and group discussions following field trips; environmental threats not covered in field trips.
