EN 2230 650: Studies in Poetics

EN 2230 introduces issues and concepts in the analysis and theory of poetry from different historical periods. The course tries to foster the student's appreciation of the poem as a work of art, and to help the student understand the poetic content encountered in other senior English courses. The course also includes a number of prose essays that introduce students to a variety of approaches (e.g., formalist, structuralist, psychoanalytical) to the subject of poetic theory. Both the weekly readings and the written assignments are devoted to close readings of a limited number of poems; students will become familiar with techniques of versification and rhetoric, and they will refine their analytical skills through a number of brief analyses and one essay.
