Prof. A. Conway Winter Course, English 2620G / Women's Studies 2252G

Special Topics: Laughing Feminisms

This course is not a study of humor in feminist theory and practice, although we will study stand-up comedy in the last week of class. Rather, the class advances feminism's joyful aspect. It responds, first, to media representations of feminism as a soul-deadening exercise in political correctness. Second, it shifts feminism's theoretical emphasis away from the hermeneutics of suspicion. Late twentieth-century theory emphasizes the need for us to interrogate our "common sense" understandings of the world, so capable of transmitting—among other things—racist, sexist, and homophobic values. In the past decade, an alternative perspective has arisen, one that preserves a more optimistic relation to the worlds in which we live.

Readings

We intersperse our readings in theory and culture with a study of three women's texts, each framed with historical and theoretical reflections on the questions raised by their authors: religion, science, and race. How do these authors transform the masculinist traditions they've inherited? Our last four weeks will be spent on recent developments in LBGT studies, research methods, and, finally, women and comedy.
