# **Course Description:**

This course will examine cultural practices, including literary, visual and filmic texts, in relation to the discourses on human rights. Students will examine the discourses of human rights, the field of "Human Rights literatures" and a selection of testimonial, literary and visual texts that challenge, intervene and expand upon contemporary human rights discourses. We will discuss issues related to human rights in war-torn contexts, the figure of the child and human rights, the meaning of being "human," and consider key terms such as "freedom" and "equality."
