Learning Objectives:

The principal aims and intended outcomes of the course are:

- to give students an overview of English literature from the Middle Ages to the present, with some attention to recent Canadian writers;
- to introduce them to a variety of historical perspectives and critical approaches;
- to permit them to strengthen their writing and research skills and to apply them to the study of literature;
- to enable them to deepen their interest in and enjoyment of the study and use of English.

Methods of Evaluation

1.	Essay written in tutorial, September 22-26 (approximately 400 words)	2%
2.	Essay assigned in tutorial, September 22-26 (approximately 500 words)	3%
3.	Essay assigned in tutorial, October 13-17 (approximately 750 words)	4%
4.	Essay assigned in tutorial, November 10-14 (approximately 750 words)	8%
5.	Essay assigned in tutorial, January 5-9 (approximately 1200 words)	10%
6.	Essay assigned in tutorial, February 2-6 (approximately 1500-2000 words)	18%

A student must receive a passing grade for both term work and the final examination in order to receive a passing grade for the course. This applies to all courses in all programs offered by the department. Students whose term and final exam grades average 50% or above, even though one of the two is a failure, shall receive a default grade of 48%. Please note: The department of English & Writing Studies does not release final grades. All undergraduate grade reports will be available online from the Office of the Registrar.

Policy on late assignments:

Anyone who has a valid reason for not meeting the assignment deadline must give the tutorial leader his/her reason **in** writing before the due date and arrange for an extension. Otherwise, late assignments will be penalized at a rate of 2% a **day** to a maximum of 10 days, including weekends, after which they may not be accepted.

Value of in-class test, tutorial grade, and final examination:

The in-class test on January 17 and the tutorial grade are each worth 10% and the final examination 35% of the final grade. The tutorial grade will take account of attendance and preparedness as well as frequency and quality of contributions. You are reminded of the English Department's policy that a student must pass both the term work and the final examination to receive credit for a course.

Plagiarism is a major academic offence.

Plagiarism Checking:

All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for the detection of plagiarism. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. Use of the service is subject to the licensing agreement, currently between The University of Western Ontario and Turnitin.com http://www.turnitin.com.

All instances of plagiarism will be reported to the Chair of Undergraduate Studies. Proven cases of plagiarism will result in a grade of zero for the assignment. Subsequent offences will result in failure for the course.
