This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

Course Description

This course introduces you to some of the most influential works of drama, poetry, and prose of the Restoration and eighteenth century. We will analyze texts carefully with the aim of understanding the literary innovations of our authors. We will also study contexts and criticism to grasp how the eighteenth- century British made sense of themselves and of life.

Objectives:

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- Discuss the development of English literary themes, genres, and modes;
- Creatively and intellectually engage with readings;
- Work in groups on collaborative project;
- Compose essays with complex arguments;
- Comprehend and write cogent summaries of scholarly essays discussed in class and on your own;
- Find relevant secondary sources on your own; find relevant primary sources;
- Successfully incorporate scholarly criticism into complex arguments in your essays.

Your participation grade will also depend on a short, team exercise in which you and two other students teach a text to the class. In order to do well, you must do all the reading, do it critically, and come prepared to contribute.
