Course Description:

While the Gothic genre dates back to the eighteenth century, the last six decades have witnessed its veritable explosion. This aesthetic mode crosses all kinds of media, including literature, film, dance, video, and photography, and invites us to think about the functions of horror in the contemporary age (that is, since the Second World War). Through novelists like Richard Matheson, Shirley Jackson, Stephen King, and Toni Morrison, and in films like *The Ring*, and *Pontypool*, we will ask the following questions: What kinds of social or personal anxieties does horror register? How do contemporary monsters look different from their predecessors? In what ways has technology changed what terrifies us? And why, ultimately, is being terrified such a popular and lucrative business?

Objectives:

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- Identify and analyze coherently certain cultural problems across a range of media, including literature, film, photography, and dance;
- Apply literary, visual, and other cultural theories to an array of works;
- Develop further their written/oral communication skills in the clear and organized presentation of an argument/hypothesis within the prescribed word limit of a research essay, other written assignments, and class participation.

Methods of Evaluation

The grade for the course will be arrived at as follows:

- Three Reading Quizzes: 5% each
- One Comparative Essay: 2000 words plus Works Cited: 50%
- Final Examination: 35%

A student **must** receive a passing grade for both term work and the final examination in order to receive a passing grade for the course. This applies to all courses in all programs offered by the department. Students whose term and final exam grades average 50% or above, even though one of the two is a failure, shall receive a default grade of 48%. **Please note**: The department of English & Writing Studies does not release final grades.
