Course Description

In the nineteenth century, women readers and women writers were an important part of the new mass market for English literature, often leading in the emergent campaign for women's rights. This course will discuss these and other issues in fiction, non-fiction, and poetry by women from the 1790s to 1900. 3 hours, 0.5 course

Objectives:

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- Demonstrate increased proficiency in research about nineteenth-century British literature
- Present their analysis of nineteenth-century writings by and about women in a clear, compelling, and concise prose style free from technical errors

Whenever students take an idea or a passage from another author, they must acknowledge their debt both by using quotation marks where appropriate and by proper referencing such as footnotes or citations. Essays

Essay 1: Choose ONE work on the course and write an argumentative essay that focuses on one of the following ten topics listed below. Be sure to narrow and refine your topic so that it is very specific and clear. Do early research on the topic so that you can develop your essay gradually.

Length: 1500 words

Format: MLA 8th edition for undergraduate research essays

Worth: 15%

Due: Oct. 16, 2019

Submit as an attachment in Word via OWL only.

Possible Topics:

Space or place Travel

Emotions or affect Labour or work

Wives and/or husbands or the single life Servants
Sexuality Ownership
Narrative point of view Money

Essay 2: Choose TWO different works from the one you examined in Essay 1. As with the first essay, choose ONE of the broad topics listed above (which you must narrow down very specifically to construct a clear argument).

Again: do some preliminary research on this topic with reference to the play you are exploring. You may write more than once on the same topic (for example, Servants), but make sure you cover TWO different works from the one you examined in Essay 1.

Length: 2500 words

Format: MLA 8 for undergraduate research essays

Worth: 25%

Due: Nov.27, 2019

Accommodation
