Course Description

Food is part of our everyday lives, but how is it represented in literature, theory, and practice? This course opens up the exciting field of food studies through the lens of the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries. We'll take a new look at some familiar texts, such as Shakespeare's *Titus Andronicus*, with its final scene of unwitting cannibalism, and Milton's *Paradise Lost*, with its depiction of a world destroyed by an act of eating. But we'll also consider lesser-known material, such as Margaret Cavendish's *Poems and Fancies*, in which death is likened to a cook, and Hannah Woolley's popular recipe book, *The Queen-Like Closet*. Addressing topics such as gender and class, colonialism and localism, we'll also do some cooking and make a visit to the Western Archives.

Objectives:

- Learn about the field of early modern food studies
- Engage critically and creatively with canonical and non-canonical literature through discussion, writing, and practice
- Explore relationships between historical context, literary criticism, theory, and practice
- Discover connections between the past and present
- Become acquainted with archival research
- Approach critical analysis through both academic and personal/experiential perspectives
- Develop effective arguments through a combination of close reading and independent research
- Evaluate and integrate secondary criticism into your own arguments
- Communicate with clarity, respect, and care in class discussions and written work

Course Ethos

Our class will honour the principles of equity, diversity, and inclusion. We will use each other's preferred and chosen names and pronouns; we will engage in respectful and generous conversation with each other; we will avoid language that is hurtful, violent, or exclusive. We will also acknowledge that we may make mistakes, and that learning from each other and questioning ourselves is part of the EDI process.

Methods of Evaluation

Academic Consideration for Student Absence

Students will have up to two (2) opportunities during the regular academic year to use an on-line portal to self-report an absence during the term, provided the following conditions are met: the absence is no more than 48 hours in duration, and the assessment for which consideration is being sought is worth 30% or less of the student's final grade. Students are expected to contact their instructors within 24 hours of the end of the period of the self-reported absence, unless noted on the syllabus. Students are not able to use the self-reporting option in the following circumstances:

- for exams scheduled by the Office of the Registrar (e.g., December and April exams)
- absence of a duration greater than 48 hours,
- assessments worth more than 30% of the student's final grade.
- if a student has already used the self-reporting portal twice during the academic year If the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence are *not* met, students will need to provide a Student Medical Certificate if the absence is medical, or provide appropriate documentation if there are compassionate grounds for the absence in question. Students are encouraged to contact their Faculty academic counselling office to obtain more information about the relevant documentation.

Students should also note that individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds,

or for other reasons. All documentation required for absences that are not covered by the Self-Reported Absence Policy must be submitted to the Academic Counselling office of a student's Home Faculty.
