Antirequisites: English 1020E, English 1035E; Prerequisite: 85% or better in Grade 12U English or permission of the Department.

The principal aims of English 1022E are: (1) to give students an overview of English literature from the Middle Ages to the present, with some attention to recent Canadian writers; (2) to introduce students to a variety of literary genres, historical perspectives, and critical approaches; (3) to strengthen students' writing and research skills and to apply them to the study of literature; (4) to enable students to deepen their interest in and enjoyment of the study and use of English. Beyond this, we will explore how the writing and reading of literature are in and of themselves inherently and intensely political acts, asking us to think through the most problematic issues of our or any time – sex, race, gender, class – with a degree of tolerance and open-mindedness rarely possible in the supposedly 'real' world of everyday events and happenings. Above all, then, the purpose of English 1022 E is this: to explore how literature and the arts are how we become both self-award and aware of others.
