Course Description

An introduction to important issues in the history of literary criticism and theory from Plato to the twentieth century.

Course Materials**Required Texts:**

The Norton Anthology of Theory and Criticism, Third Edition (2018), Ed. by Vincent B. Leitch *et al.*

Note: While the UWO bookstore would be the most convenient source for the anthology, you might be able to find a better deal online. You may also want to consider such options as book-pooling, photocopying, and so on.

Research Essay: A formal, extended discussion of a theoretical issue pertaining to the history of criticism and theory, as it is reflected in at least two of the theoretical works studied in this course. Secondary research is required (at least 2 materials – essays/articles from books/academic journals). MLA citation style is required. An extended description of this assignment, as well as a list of suggested topics, will be provided in due time.

Response papers: These are short (about 350 words) commentaries on a theorist and the class discussions that accompanied the lecture on that theorist. You will e-mail these to me before the due dates. In the unfortunate but unlikely event of a discussion-free lecture, you may focus on the text. A good response paper will be intelligent, lively, and informal, and **will incorporate a discussion of other students' responses in class**. Individual response papers may be discussed in class, especially if they are original and/or well-written.

Final Exam: A combination of short-answer and essay questions. The exam will be cumulative and will be written during the exam period (date, time and location TBA).

Note on lectures: Given the amount of material we will be covering, students are advised to read the texts ahead of the lecture. Lecture notes used in the Powerpoints will be available on OWL after the lectures, but **not all the material covered in class will appear on OWL**, so regular attendance and note-taking are advisable.

All instances of plagiarism will be reported to the Chair of Undergraduate Studies. Proven cases of plagiarism will result in a grade of zero for the assignment. Subsequent offences will result in failure for the course.
