English 3316E (001) Love in the Middle Ages Fall/Winter 2023-24

Antirequisites: The former English 3116E.

Prerequisites: At least 60% in 1.0 of English 1020-1999 or permission of the Department.

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

Course Description

Love may seem like a universal emotion, but as Chaucer notes:

Ek for to wynnen love in sondry ages, In sondry londes, sondry ben usages.

If people express their love differently in different ages and lands, does it follow that they also *feel* love differently? This course will explore a variety of expressions and experiences of love in the medieval period, including romantic, erotic, familial, divine, and platonic. Focusing on the literature of late medieval England, we will place this English literature within a broader European context. We will also consider the historical context of these various expressions—such as laws and customs concerning courtship, marriage, and childrearing—as well as the many philosophical questions that the experience of love provokes. While exploring this most fundamental of emotional states, we will learn to read and enjoy Middle English literature.

Objectives:

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- Read and pronounce Middle English with sufficient competency that they can examine the content, themes, rhetoric, and prosody of Middle English literature;
- Describe and explain the literary and aesthetic expectations of a variety of medieval genres, including (but not limited to) lyric, romance, fabliaux, hagiography, and dream vision;
- Construct and present a complex argument about one or more Middle English texts
 which demonstrates mastery of the points above, and is firmly place within existing
 theoretical and critical debates about the literature.

Methods of Evaluation

The grade for the course will be arrived at as follows:

Reading responses (15%)

You will be required to submit 5 reading responses over the course of the year, each worth 3% of your course grade. You will have a choice of dates for submission. Reading responses will be assessed on a pass/fail basis. See **Reading Responses** instruction sheet for details.

Attendance and Class Participation (10%)

To receive full marks for attendance and participation, you must attend almost every class and you must come to class prepared, having read the assigned material. Roughly half of your participation mark will be based on taking your turn in the note-taking rota (see below, Additional Information).

Essay 1 (15%)

Your first essay will be due on **Friday**, **Nov 24**, **2023**. Topics and instructions will be available in the Assignments folder on OWL.

Essay 2 (30%)

Your second essay will be due on **Friday**, **March 29**, **2024**. Topics and instructions will be available in the Assignments folder on OWL.

Final exam (30%)

The final exam will consist of essay questions and will cover material from the entire year. The date of the exam will be set by the Registrar's Office later in the year. You will be permitted to bring all required textbooks, annotated in your own hand, with you into the exam. No other notes will be allowed.
