## Monsters, Ghosts, and Demons in the Nineteenth Century

**Course Description:** Monsters, ghosts, and demons appear in many stories. This course charts the development of these supernatural beings in the nineteenth century, including in *Frankenstein*, *The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde*, and *Dracula*. The course will examine several gothic narratives in their historical, cultural, and artistic contexts.

The weekly course schedule consists of two hours of lecture and a third hour of tutorial discussion facilitated by a teaching assistant. In addition to providing opportunities for the discussion of reading and lecture materials, tutorials will also provide substantial instruction in effective essay writing and research methods. English 1028G is a course in its own right. It need not be taken in combination with any other course. Students who took English 1027G (The Storyteller's Art I), will have the equivalent of a 1.0 "essay" course for their breadth requirements, and completed the 1.0 credits in first-year English necessary to take senior-level courses.

**Course Objective:** Students will learn to reason logically, support claims with evidence, analyse a text, express themselves orally, and write coherently.

#### **Academic Consideration**

Instructors may designate one assignment or assessment as exempt from this allowance. In this course, requests for academic consideration pertaining to the take-home essay must be accompanied by supporting documentation. The research essay is the course's designated assignment. Late essays will be penalized at a rate of 2% per academic day.

There are no re-writes on missed quizzes because of built-in flexibility of the assignment.

Assignments with flexible deadlines and any term work that does not count towards the course grade are not eligible for additional consideration. Documentation for medical illness, when required, includes the completion of a <a href="Western Student Medical Certificate">Western Student Medical Certificate</a> (SMC) or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation, by a health care practitioner.

Requests linked to examinations scheduled by the Office of the Registrar during official examination periods as well as practice laboratory and performance tests typically scheduled in the last week of term always require formal supporting documentation.

#### **Attendance**

Attendance is mandatory in all classes and tutorials. In cases of excessive absenteeism (e.g. more than 9 unexcused hours for a half course, 18 for a full course), which are not accounted for by either academic consideration or accommodation, students may be debarred from taking the final examination and will receive an official warning to this effect by or before the course drop date (see Senate policy). In classes with or without final exams, students who do not attend class will receive 0% for course participation grades. Unless other policies dictate a different set of penalties in specific English and Writing Studies programs, this will apply to all department programs.
