Antirequisites: English 2230F/G.

**Prerequisites**: At least 60% in 1.0 of English 1020-1999, or 1.0 of Film 1000-1999 plus English 2112F/G, Film 2212F/G, or Theatre Studies 2212F/G, or permission of the department.

Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.

### Course Description

An introduction to important issues and concepts in the theory and analysis of poetry from different periods.

## Objectives:

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- Understand basic concepts involving rhyme, rhythm, and poetic diction
- Recognise various types of meter
- Acquire basic scanning technique
- Be able to comment intelligently on traditional as well as contemporary poetry

## **Statements**

In classes with or without final exams, students who do not attend class will receive 0% for course participation grades.
