Am I to be the Hero of my own Life: Nineteenth-Century Fictions of the Individual and the World Winter 2025

**Instructor**: Dr. Jo Devereux

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Prerequisite: At least 60% in 1.0 of English 1020-1999 or permission of the Department.

## Course Description

Nineteenth-century philosophers celebrated the individual, but the period also saw the emergence of new forms of social control in politics, the market, and the workplace. This course examines the individual's relation to society and the world in nineteenth-century English literature. Looking at examples of Victorian fiction, satire, and autobiography, we will explore the problems of gender, race, and social class and will consider the effects of industrialization and the challenges faced particularly by women of colour in the racialized and colonialist society of nineteenth-century Britain.

#### Objectives:

By the end of the course, successful students will be able to:

- Write critically about nineteenth-century literary representations of the individual in his/her/their world
- Present logical and reasoned arguments with a sophisticated use of evidence
- Demonstrate familiarity with the historical context of 19<sup>th</sup>-century fiction
- Show knowledge of the reception history of the selected readings from their time to our present moment

### **Academic Consideration**

### Assignments

Essay 1: Due Feb.6 at 11:59 PM

Length: 1000 words

Worth: 15%

Use MLA 8 or 9 formatting.

#### Instructions

For this essay, you will be given a choice of three passages from *Agnes Grey* and asked to choose ONE passage and provide a close reading of this passage. Explore the imagery and other literary devices and relate the passage to the novel as a whole. Be precise and specific in your analysis. Present a clear, defensible argument about what you believe to be the most significant element in the passage. No need for secondary sources for this essay, but if you do use any you must cite them correctly using MLA format for documentation.

Submit your essay as a Word document or PDF to OWL.

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Essay Proposal: Due March 6 at 11:59 PM

Length: 500 words

Worth: 20%

Use MLA 8 or 9 formatting.

#### Instructions

Write a 500 word proposal for a 2500-word essay on ONE of the following topics as applied to TWO of the novels (NOT *Agnes Grey*) on the course (with thanks to the British Association for Victorian Studies for the topics):

- · Creation of the Self
- · The Changing Self
- · The Fragmented Self
- The Self in Time/Temporality
- · The Double/Doubled Self
- · Identity and the Supernatural
- · Internal/External Worlds
- · The Contextual/Historical Self
- · The Gendered Self
- Imposed Identity

Your proposal should tell the reader what questions you plan to explore in your paper. You will need to do some research into your topic in order to write your proposal. We will work on this in class before the due date.

Submit your proposal as a Word document or PDF to OWL.

## Essay 2 Research Paper: Due April 3 at 11:59 PM

Length: 2500 words

Worth: 25%

Use MLA 8 or 9 formatting.

## Instructions

Develop your proposal into a 2500-word research essay. Use at least 4 secondary sources for your essay. Spend an equal amount of time on each of the two novels you discuss.

Submit your essay as a Word document or PDF to OWL.
