Methods of Evaluation

Each student will be expected to give TWO twenty-minute seminars (one per term). **One week** after the oral delivery, each student will submit a written version (approx. 8 pages double space, the standard length for most conference papers). Each student will also write two essays, one about 3,000 words in length, the other 5,000 words. The essays and seminar papers should all be on different topics. Not necessarily different texts, but different topics.
