

FACULTY POSITION Probationary (Tenure-Track) – Assistant Professor SCHOOL of COMMUNICATION SCIENCES and DISORDERS

The Faculty of Health Sciences (FHS) at Western University invites applications for a full-time probationary (tenure-track) position at the rank of Assistant Professor in the School of Communication Sciences and Disorders (CSD) with academic responsibilities in research, teaching, and service. The anticipated start date will be July 1, 2024, or as negotiated. Salary will be commensurate with qualifications and experience.

We are seeking energetic and dynamic candidates who will be able to contribute substantially to the teaching, research, and service efforts of the School in the field of speech-language pathology. Applicants demonstrating expertise in voice, fluency and/or acquired speech disorders are especially encouraged to apply. However, applicants with research expertise in medical speech-language pathology or other topic areas will also be considered. The successful candidate will also have a demonstrated capacity to contribute substantively to an inclusive and diverse academic community.

Applicants are encouraged to think about how their research program complements our existing research areas identified in the <u>Faculty of Health Sciences Strategic Research Plan</u> and in the <u>School of CSD Strategic Plan</u>. The successful candidate will have opportunities to develop collaborative relationships with current CSD faculty conducting research in related areas (e.g., PRECISe [Practice-Based Research Collaborative in Speech-Language Pathology], an FHS Research Group) as well as a number of researchers in other Faculties and programs at Western including the internationally acclaimed <u>National Centre for Audiology</u>, the <u>Canadian Centre for Activity and Aging</u>, and <u>The Brain and Mind Institute</u>, among others. The selected appointee will be expected to establish and maintain an externally funded research program, teach in the School of CSD, and supervise research-based graduate students in the FHS graduate programs.

The School of CSD is an international leader in the professions of audiology and speech-language pathology, offering Master of Clinical Science degrees in Audiology and Speech-Language Pathology and participating in the Health and Rehabilitation Sciences (HRS) Graduate Program. The HRS Program was the first in Canada to host a combined clinical-research degree (i.e., MCISc-PhD) in Speech and Language Sciences and in Hearing Sciences. The School maintains the research-oriented H.A. Leeper Speech and Hearing Clinic, which includes the provincially-funded tykeTALK and Infant Hearing Programs. Within audiology, current specialized clinical services include infant assessment and assistive device fitting, pediatric amplification, aural rehabilitation, and geriatrics. Within speech-language pathology, the clinic currently provides specializations in preschool speech and language, speech and language disorders in school-age children, and adult and adolescent voice, fluency and acquired neurogenic communication disorders. The School's faculty members are active and productive researchers, engaged in both theoretical and clinical work. The School and the Faculty are committed to developing new as well as expanding existing partnerships with local, regional, national, and international interdisciplinary colleagues. We are also actively engaged in the process of embedding a culture of equity, diversity, and inclusivity in our School.

With annual research funding exceeding \$220 million, and an international reputation for success, Western ranks as one of Canada's top research-intensive universities. Our research excellence expands knowledge and drives discovery with real-world application. Western also provides an exceptional employment experience, offering competitive salaries, and a wide range of employment opportunities. Qualifications:

- PhD or equivalent in speech-language pathology or a related field
- Eligibility for licensure with the College of Audiologists and Speech-Language Pathologists of Ontario preferred
- Demonstrated potential to establish an independent research program in communication sciences and disorders
- Demonstrated excellence in and ability to contribute to graduate level teaching in communication sciences and disorders
