



CALL FOR APPLICATIONS: Tier 2 Canada Research Chair in Social Inequities in Mental Health Services (Internal) Schulich School of Medicine & Dentistry Western University

The Department of Epidemiology and Biostatistics at Western University, invites applications for Tier 2 Canada Research Chair (CRC) in Social Inequities in Mental Health Services. This CRC opportunity is open to faculty who currently hold a probationary (tenure-track) or tenured position in the relevant field in the Department of Epidemiology and Biostatistics.

The successful candidate will have demonstrated a passion for studying the role of social determinants in mental health outcomes and access to health services related to mental health. They will have methodological expertise in techniques which may include, but are not limited to, observational epidemiological studies, health services research and use of administrative data concerning mental health outcomes and health service use.

The successful candidate will hold a PhD with advanced background in Epidemiology or related disciplines (e.g., Health Services Research). The successful candidate's research interests will be supported by a record of external peer-reviewed funding (e.g., CIHR), publications in field-specific journals, and national/international exposure through invited lectures and/or conference symposia as appropriate for their discipline and career stage. Evidence of research leadership potential would be beneficial. In short, the successful candidate will be an emerging researcher with demonstrated research activity and creativity, acknowledged by peers as possessing the potential to achieve international recognition and to lead in their field in the next five to ten years, and possess the potential to attract, teach and mentor excellent trainees, students, and future researchers.

Nominees for Tier 2 chair positions must be emerging scholars. They should, at a minimum, be assistant or associate professors, or possess the necessary qualifications to be appointed to these levels. See <u>Tier 2 Justifications</u> for more information. In accordance with the regulations set for Tier 2 Canada Research Chairs (<u>www.chairschaires.gc.ca</u>), Tier 2 chairs are intended for exceptional emerging scholars (i.e., candidates must have less than 10 years of experience as an active researcher in their field at the time of nomination). Applicants who are more than 10 years from having earned their highest degree (and where career breaks exist, such as maternity, parental or extended sick leave, clinical training, etc.) may have their eligibility for a Tier 2 Chair assessed through the program's Tier 2 justification process. The selected candidate will be nominated by Western University to apply for the Tier 2 CRC in Social Inequalities in Mental Health Services at the earliest opportunity.
