#### **Calendar Course Description (including prerequisites/anti-requisites):**

An examination of the principles and processes of human physical growth and motor development from birth to maturity. Attention will focus on physical-structural growth, age and sex-associated variation in growth and performance, biologic maturation, and the relationship of these to motor-development/performance during infancy, childhood and adolescence.

Antirequisite(s): Health Sciences 2700A/B.

Prerequisite(s): Completion of second year Kinesiology or permission of Kinesiology.

Extra Information: 3 lecture hours.

#### **Course Evaluation:**

Assignments are due as stated in the course syllabus and will not be accepted late, except under medical or other compassionate circumstances with documentation. Submitting a late assignment without appropriate documentation will result in a zero (0) grade. A missed mid-term examination, without appropriate documentation will result in a zero (0) grade. Acceptable reasons might include hospital stays, serious illness, family emergencies (like serious accidents, illness or death) or similar circumstances. There will be no make-ups or re-weightings for assignments/quizzes as they are each worth very little (approximately 1% of course grade per quiz) and each has a two week time frame in which it can be completed. In the event of a missed midterm with appropriate documentation there will be no make-up exams however the weighting of the missed exam will be carried forward (re-weighted) to the subsequent exam.

- 1. Revel Chapter/Module online Quizzes: one quiz per chapter covered. Marks from each quiz will be cumulative and translate to 25% of course grade when totaled.
- 2. Mid Term Exam: Online (date Oct. 28<sup>th</sup>, 2020, 2-5pm) 35% of final grade. Format = multiple choice and short answer questions.
- 3. The Final Examination (40% of final grade) date TBD (scheduled by Registrar's Office) will be cumulative but weighted towards the material covered after the second midterm exam. This will be a combination of multiple choice and short/long answer questions.

#### **Notes**

- 1. Over the course of the semester, we will attempt to cover the material indicated. It is possible that we might not complete the suggested material, or that additional material may be added.
- 2. Lectures will be developed with the digital text as the primary source, but additional material may be included; slides with accompanying lecture audio will be posted weekly on OWL.
- 3. The learning objectives associated with each section are designed to assist the student in focusing their reading and effort. The topics to be discussed cannot be considered exclusive however, and the student is responsible for all material covered.
- 4. Exam periods have been selected to conflict as little as possible with other scheduled classes. Please report any potential conflicts NOW, do not wait until the week before the exam. Further, exams have been scheduled well in advance, hence, planned vacations, job interviews etc. will not be accepted as valid reasons to miss a scheduled exam. All required papers may be subject to submission for textual similarity review to the commercial plagiarism detection software under license to the University for the detection of plagiarism. All papers submitted for such checking will be included as source documents in the reference database for the purpose of detecting plagiarism of papers subsequently submitted to the system. - B) Computer marked multiple-choice tests and/or exams may be subject to submission for similarity review by software that will check for unusual coincidences in answer patterns that may indicate cheating.

#### **Academic Consideration for Student Absence**

Students will have up to two (2) opportunities during the regular academic year to use an on-line portal to self-report an absence during the term, provided the following conditions are met: the absence is no more than 48 hours in duration, and the assessment for which consideration is being sought is worth 30% or less of the student's final grade. Students are expected to contact their instructors within 24 hours of the end of the period of the self-reported absence, unless noted on the syllabus. Students are not able to use the self-reporting option in the following circumstances:

- for exams scheduled by the Office of the Registrar (e.g., December and April exams)
- absence of a duration greater than 48 hours,
- assessments worth more than 30% of the student's final grade.
- if a student has already used the self-reporting portal twice during the academic year

If the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence are *not* met, students will need to provide a Student Medical Certificate if the absence is medical, or provide appropriate documentation if there are compassionate grounds for the absence in question. Students are encouraged to contact their Faculty academic counselling office to obtain more information about the relevant documentation.

Students are reminded that they should consider carefully the implications of postponing tests or midterm exams or delaying submission of work, and are encouraged to make appropriate decisions based on their specific circumstances.

Students should also note that individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds, or for other reasons. All documentation required for absences that are not covered by the Self-Reported Absence Policy must be submitted to the Academic Counselling office of a student's Home Faculty.

# **Religious Accommodation**

7. **Examination Conflicts**: A student with examinations having flexible submission times (e.g., where one or more examination is a take-home examination) cannot request alternative arrangements unless a conflict cannot be avoided by rescheduling writing the exam to a different time within the window specified by the instructor. This applies to direct conflicts as well as "heavy load" conflicts (e.g., three exams within a 23-hour period). The student should discuss any concerns about a potential conflict and/or request accommodation with their academic counselling unit prior to the deadline to drop a course without academic penalty

In the case of online examinations, an "Examination Conflict Room," which may be assigned when a student is scheduled to write two proctored exams concurrently, will be interpreted as arrangements for continuous proctoring.

8. **Grades**: Where possible assignment objectives and rubrics will be posted on OWL. Should you have a concern regarding the grade you received for an assignment or feel that it is unfair in any way, you must wait 24 hours from the receipt of the assignment to approach the instructor or TA. In doing so, please make an appointment and prepare in writing, with evidence, why you feel your grade is inappropriate. Please be aware that in requesting a grade reassessment, your grade could go up/down/or stay the same. Note that calculations errors (which do occur!) should be brought to my attention immediately.

Contingency Plan for an In-Person Class Pivoting to 100% Online Learning: In the event of a COVID-19 resurgence during the course that necessitates the course delivery moving away from face-to-face interaction, all remaining course content will be delivered entirely online, either synchronously (i.e., at the times indicated in the timetable) or asynchronously (e.g., posted on OWL for students to view at their convenience).   - [suggested for cases where video is used] please be prepared to turn your video camera off at the instructor's request if the internet connection becomes unstable
  - unless invited by your instructor, do **not** share your screen in the meeting

The course instructor will act as moderator for the class and will deal with any questions from participants. To participate please consider the following:

- if you wish to speak, use the "raise hand" function and wait for the instructor to acknowledge you before beginning your comment or question
- remember to unmute your microphone and turn on your video camera before speaking
- self-identify when speaking.
