Calendar Course Description (including prerequisites/anti-requisites): An overview of the impact of nutrition and exercise on selected health and exercise performance measures. Via lecture and reading materials, students will come to appreciate how lifestyle decisions which are under their control can enhance their health and their performance.

Antirequisite(s): Kinesiology 4471B (001) 2008-09; Foods and Nutrition 4477A/B.

Prerequisite(s): Kinesiology 3339A/B or Foods and Nutrition 3339A/B.

Extra Information: 3 lecture hours.

My Course Description

This course explores the relationship between exercise, nutrition, and their effects on both overall health and exercise performance. You will gain an understanding of how physical activity and dietary choices, which are under your control, could contribute to health, fitness, and

disease prevention/treatment.

Learning Outcomes/Schedule:

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand and recognize how personal lifestyle choices and behaviors significantly impact health and well-being.
- 2. Understand the crucial role of nutrition and exercise in enhancing both lifespan and quality of life
- 3. Discuss mechanism(s) responsible for optimal health
- 4. Understand scientific method
- 5. Interpret current research findings regarding the effects of nutrition and exercise on health and wellness

Required Course Material: No required text. All required readings will be posted on OWL Brightspace.

Course Evaluation:

Assignments will not be accepted late, except under medical or other compassionate circumstances. Submitting a late assignment without appropriate documentation will result in a zero (0) grade. Acceptable reasons include hospital stays, serious illness, family emergencies (like serious accidents, illness or death) or any other extenuating circumstances. Due to the size of this class, a makeup midterm quiz is not possible; therefore, if the midterm is missed and appropriate documentation is provided, the point value of the missed quiz will be added to the value of the final exam. If the presentation is missed and appropriate documentation is provided it will be rescheduled.

Mid-term Quiz (Feb 26, in-person, during class time)
 Group presentation (after week 2, throughout the term)

In groups of 2 or 3, students will deliver a 10-minute research-based oral presentation on a chosen exercise/nutrition topic, using a maximum of 7 slides (including a title slide, 5 content slides, and references slide). A one-paragraph summary of the topic must be shared with the class at least one day prior to the presentation. All students should be prepared to ask questions after each presentation.

3. Research proposal (Mar 21) 20%

Submit a research proposal of a current nutrition/exercise topic of your choice; format will include an introduction based on previous research, purpose/hypothesis, methods to be used, expected results, and several key references. This proposal is meant to extend the information learned from your presentation attempting to discover some novel information on the topic (Limit: two pages single spaced, excluding references and title page).

4. Final Exam (comprehensive)

Done during exam period, scheduled by Office of Registrar. Those who miss the final, with approved academic considerations, will write the make-up on the common special make-up date (scheduled within first two weeks of May 2025)

Please note that any academic considerations granted in this course will be determined by the instructor of this course, in consultation with the academic advisors in your Faculty of Registration, in accordance with information presented in this course syllabus. Supporting documentation for academic considerations for absences due to illness should use the Student Medical Certificate or, where that is not possible, equivalent documentation by a health care practitioner.

Appealing a Grade Within this Course

You have the right to appeal any grade within this course. The grounds for a grade appeal may be one or more of: medical or compassionate circumstances, extenuating circumstances beyond the student's control, bias, inaccuracy, or unfairness. All grounds advanced in a request for relief must be supported by a clear and detailed explanation of the reasons for the request together with all supporting documentation.

Appeals generally proceed in this order:

- 1. Course instructor (informal consultation)
- 2. Department Chair (submission of written request)
- 3. The Dean of the Faculty (submission of written request)

In the case of perceived procedural unfairness, steps 2 and 3 are carried out within the Department and Faculty offering the course. In the case of extenuating medical or compassionate circumstances that impact on a grade, steps 2 and 3 are carried out within a student's Home Department and Faculty.

A request for relief against a mark or grade must be initiated with the instructor as soon as possible after the mark is issued.
