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**Course Information**

Chronic disease is a significant economic burden for our health care system. This course will examine the prevalence of chronic disease, key factors associated with the significant increase in chronic diseases, and strategies for primary and secondary prevention. By the end of this course students will be able to:

- Identify chronic diseases and their impact on the Canadian health care system
- Identify factors contributing to the increase of chronic disease among the Canadian population
- Identify, examine, and critique primary prevention strategies for chronic disease prevention and management
- Identify, examine, and critique secondary prevention strategies for chronic disease prevention and management
- Collaborate with peers to create and deliver a dynamic presentation addressing a current topic in chronic disease prevention/management
- Engage in critical scholarship of various chronic disease prevention and management topics

Students are expected to prepare for the course by completing required readings prior to class and come to class prepared to engage with the material. The grade for this course will be comprised of a midterm examination, group presentation, participation, and final examination. The midterm and final examinations will consist of multiple choice questions covering all information related to lectures and assigned readings.

There is no required text for this course; however, readings/materials will be made available through Sakai and online access to journals through the Western library. Please consult the reading schedule below.

## Group Presentation

*Purpose:* The objective of this assignment is to prepare a dynamic presentation examining/critiquing a current chronic disease prevention or management strategy/program that is being delivered in Canada.

*Presentations must include the following components (20%):*

- Outline of the health topic
- Description of the strategy/program
- Critical appraisal of the strategy/program
- Suggestions for improvement of the strategy/program
- A minimum of 5 scholarly, peer-reviewed articles

**Attendance to Peer Presentations**

Attendance to peer presentation grades will be determined based on class consensus (2.5%).

**Participation/Critical Scholarship**

Engaging in critical scholarship of ideas presented in class demonstrates true mastery of knowledge. To that end, each week 5-10 students will be selected to submit critical inquiry questions based on the lecture (Wednesday at noon). One question will be selected by the instructor and posted on Sakai (Wednesday by 5pm for the following week’s critical scholarship) and students are expected to come to class prepared to engage in critical scholarship of the topic. Students are required to participate in 5 critical scholarships (5 X 4% each). There are six critical scholarship opportunities, and the highest 5 grades will be counted (20%).

The University recognizes that a student's ability to meet his/her academic responsibilities may, on occasion, be impaired by medical illness. Illness may be acute (short term), or it may be chronic (long term), or chronic with acute episodes. The University further recognizes that medical situations are deeply personal and respects the need for privacy and confidentiality in these matters. However, in order to ensure fairness and consistency for all students, academic accommodation for work representing 10% or more of the student's overall grade in the course shall be granted only in those cases where there is documentation indicating that the student was seriously affected by illness and could not reasonably be expected to meet his/her academic responsibilities.

A UWO Student Medical Certificate (SMC) is required where a student is seeking academic accommodation. This documentation should be obtained at the time of the initial consultation with the physician or walk-in clinic.
