School of Health Studies Health Sciences 2110B – Resilience and the Creation of Wellbeing Winter 2023

COURSE DESCRIPTION

Personal resilience is widely recognized to be a cornerstone of wellbeing, and is considered essential to success in environments ranging from schools to workplaces. In this interdisciplinary course, we study "good vs poor" mental health, cultivation of resilience, creation and maintenance of wellbeing, and living well with compromised mental health.

LEARNING OUTCOMES

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- Describe and discuss the concepts resilience and wellbeing as these have been conceptualized through assigned readings and content covered in classes.
- Question commonly held beliefs about mental health to support an examination of the notions of good vs poor mental health.
- Examine the relationship of good vs poor mental health to resilience and the creation of wellbeing.
- Assess knowledge and understanding through examination of course content.
- Participate in the co-creation of a learning experience that is vital and engaging.

Prerequisites: Registration in second-year or higher, or permission of the School of Health Studies.

NOTE: Unless you have either the requisites for this course or written special permission from your Dean to enroll in it, you may be removed from this course and it will be deleted from your record. This decision may not be appealed. You will receive no adjustment to your fees in the event that you are dropped from a course for failing to have the necessary prerequisites.
