Description of the Course – Aims and Objectives

The course will mostly concentrate on Latin American cinemas, referring to a body of films made in different countries since the advent of sound and the rise of the first studios in the region until today, with a strong emphasis on the most recent productions which have been re-defining the landscape of these varied and rich national film industries and film cultures. Always approaching the texts as social and aesthetic practices, attention will be paid to questions of (national and cultural) identity, film history and historiography, realism and ideology, and issues of race and gender.

Learning Outcomes

Upon the effective completion of this course, it is expected that students will have obtained and developed:

- An informed understanding of films, and their respective contexts of production, which are in many ways (economically, socially, aesthetically) very distant from the Hollywood standard and the North American context.
- Critical understanding and appraisal of one's own point of view and standpoint as a knowledgeable spectator when relating to the cinemas produced by a (more or less) distant cultural Other.

Assigned weekly readings will be detailed in final version of the syllabus, to be presented on the first day of class (and subsequently uploaded on OWL).
