Course description

After a presentation of the very concept of "La Francophonie" (origin, meaning and institution), there will be readings and discussions on selected cultural and historical, political and economic topics about Francophone African countries, the Maghreb and the Antilles. The other main francophone countries are covered in other courses. As a supplement to the course's textbook, articles, films, and visual material will be used. The course will be taught in French.

1. Tests (40%)

Deux tests de compréhension seront donnés sur OWL. Chaque test couvrira le matériel qui aura été vu précédemment.

Chaque test comptera pour 20% de la note finale

2. Quizzes (10%)

Il y aura deux quizzes qui dureront à peu près 30 minutes chacun et qui seront faits sur OWL et qui porteront sur le matériel du cours. Chaque quiz comptera pour 10% de la note finale du cours.

If you miss a quiz, you will have to provide written justification from your academic counselor in your home Faculty.

You will be given two days within which you will have to submit your 30 minute timed quiz.

3. Présentation orale (10%)

Ces travaux seront faits individuellement et ou en groupes. Il y aura quatre devoirs qui seront remis pour être évalués et notés

5. Projet de recherche (30%)

Chaque étudiant(e) devra soumettre un projet de recherche sur un sujet donné. Un résumé du projet sera soumis à la fin de la troisième semaine du cours. Ce travail sera d'une longueur d'à peu près 1000 mots. Assignments submitted one week late will not be accepted unless there is written justification from your home Faculty.
