Course description

N.B.: Ce cours est enseigné à distance dans <u>le mode synchrone</u>; ce n'est pas un cours en ligne (This course is taught remotely and synchronously; it is not an online course)

After a presentation of the very concept of "La Francophonie" (origin, meaning and institution), there will be readings and discussions on selected cultural and historical, political and economic topics about Francophone African countries, the Maghreb and the Antilles.

Among other topics of interest to the course, we will discuss issues of racism and decolonization. Aussi, nous accorderons une place de choix aux auteurs tels que Françoise Bigirimana, Mariama Bhâ, Scholastique Mukasonga, Aimé Césaire et Albert Memmi.

As a supplement to the course's textbook, articles, films, and visual material will be used. <u>The course will be taught in French.</u>

1. Tests (40%)

Deux tests de compréhension seront donnés sur OWL. Chaque test couvrira le matériel qui aura été vu précédemment, en classe, sur Owl, dans les présentations ou à travers les films et documentaires.

2. Présentation orale (10%)

Chaque étudiant(e) fera une présentation orale, individuellement (15 minutes), ou en groupes de deux (20) sur un sujet choisi en accord avec le professeur.

L'évaluation, portera sur le contenu, l'organisation et le travail de préparation; il portera aussi sur la présentation du travail et sur l'usage de la langue.

Le sujet devra être approuvé par le professeur.

3. Participation (10%)

La note de participation sera attribuée en fonction de l'assiduité en classe de chaque étudiant (e): Présence et participation aux activités de la classe et aux autres travaux que le professeur aura assignés. Ces travaux seront faits individuellement et ou en groupes.

4. Projet de recherche : Travail final (40%) (i.e. No final exam)

Chaque étudiant(e) devra soumettre un projet de recherche sur un sujet donné. Un résumé du projet sera soumis à une date qui sera indiquée au début du mois d'octobre. Ce travail sera d'une longueur d'à peu près 1000 mots.

Assignments or projects submitted one week late will not be accepted unless there is written justification from your home Faculty.

Academic Consideration for Student Absence

- if a student has already used the self-reporting portal twice during the academic year If the conditions for a Self-Reported Absence are *not* met, students will need to provide a Student Medical Certificate if the absence is medical, or provide appropriate documentation if there are compassionate grounds for the absence in question. Students are encouraged to contact their Faculty academic counselling office to obtain more information about the relevant documentation.

Students should also note that individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds, or for other reasons. All documentation required for absences that are not covered by the Self-Reported Absence Policy must be submitted to the Academic Counselling office of a student's Home Faculty.
