Description et objectifs du cours

Rupture amoureuse ou conjugale, rupture avec les parents ou dans les liens sociaux, infraction au code criminel, contravention à une loi, refus des conventions romanesques traditionnelles ... L'objectif du cours est de donner un aperçu partiel de la production narrative en France depuis la première moitié du XX^e siècle, en proposant une étude poussée de trois œuvres d'auteurs différents à partir de la question suivante. Quelles ruptures et quels retours préoccupent ou caractérisent la littérature du XX^e siècle ? La notion de « rupture » nous permettra de discuter des thèmes, par exemple, de la séparation, de la déviance, de la criminalité et de l'aliénation dans les œuvres à l'étude et, parfois en parallèle, du refus des conventions majeures du roman. La notion de « retour », quant à elle, sera envisagée autant comme problématique que comme élément caractéristique de tout un pan de la littérature contemporaine.

Par l'analyse de ces textes sur le plan tant thématique que formel et esthétique, les étudiant-e-s seront amené-e-s : -à réfléchir au personnage, au narrateur, à la narration considérés dans la perspective du retour et de la rupture, et

dans la perspective de l'évolution de la littérature depuis le réalisme littéraire en France

-à comprendre les liens qui unissent et séparent les œuvres au programme

-à présenter leurs idées de manière satisfaisante, au moyen de discussions en classe, et dans leurs travaux
