Description du cours

Le XXe siècle voit la littérature se tourner vers le « formel », comme en témoignent le formalisme, le structuralisme, la narratologie, le Nouveau Roman. Cependant, dans ses formes souvent expérimentales et avant-gardistes, la force littéraire - force langagière, rythmique, vitale - ne cesse de travailler l'écriture moderne. C'est cette tension entre forme et force, entre littéralité et littéarité, que nous nous proposons d'étudier autour de trois ouvrages littéraires marquant respectivement le début, le milieu et la fin du XXe siècle. Une lecture attentive nous permettrait d'ausculter la densité et l'intensité, mais aussi la profondeur et l'obscurité de ces textes au langage en apparence limpide.

Objectifs

Les étudiants seront amenés à:

- approfondir leur connaissance de la littérature française du XXe siècle;
- affiner leur capacité de lire, d'interpréter et d'analyser, en se familiarisant avec diverses approches critiques;
- formuler leurs idées oralement (discussions, débats, exposés) et par l'écrit (questions-réponses, rapports, explications des textes, commentaires, analyses...).
