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DESCRIPTION

This course is an introduction to feminist legal theory, with a focus on feminist engagement with the law for social change in Canada. We will examine three generations of feminist legal theory (Equality, Difference, and Complex Identities) in addition to allied intellectual movements (*e.g.*, Critical Race and LGBT Theories) before turning to a series of examples of applied feminist legal theory and the feminist effort for social change. Topics may include: equality under the *Charter*, equality at work, sexual harassment, motherhood, reproduction, sexual assault, domestic violence, pornography and prostitution.

MATERIALS

- Martha Chamallas, *Introduction to Feminist Legal Theory*, 3d ed. (New York: Wolters Kluwer, 2013) available for purchase at the campus bookstore and on reserve at Weldon.
- Additional readings (cases) are posted on OWL.

OBJECTIVES

The goal of this course is to introduce students to feminist legal theory and feminist engagement with the law. Students will be introduced to the basic legal principles and doctrine in the relevant areas and will learn how to read case law and statute law critically. Through the examination of a number of legal issues and subject areas, students will be invited to reflect upon questions of feminist legal strategy and the nature of law and the Canadian legal system.

REQUIREMENTS

- 2 short essays (approx. 5 pages each): 20% each (3 essays will be assigned; students must complete at least 2. If a student chooses to complete all 3, the highest 2 grades will be used in the calculation of the final grade.)
- Midterm test: 20%Final exam: 40%
