SP 9025A: The Nineteenth Century Novel: From Literature to Adaptation

Description: This seminar will focus on selected novels from Spain and Spanish America and their adaptations into other genres, such as musical theater and film. Our primary sources will be *Pepita Jiménez* (1874) and *Cecilia Valdés* (1882). These works selected from the nineteenth century are an important part of what has been traditionally considered the literary canon. This course provides the occasion to develop foundational understandings of these works, as well as the opportunity to move beyond the literary canon into new directions.
