
Fall 2022 – Winter 2023 COLLOQUIUM – INTERDISCIPLINARY APPROACHES TO HISPANIC STUDIES Friday 1.30 – 4.30* UC. 1405 Coordination: Constanza Burucúa



DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVE

The colloquium is conceived as a space of dialogue and multi-disciplinary encounters, in which specialists within the field of Hispanic Studies, the arts, and the wide sphere of culture discuss their research and their work with graduate students, faculty members, and the university community at large.

From a wide array of theoretical and methodological approaches, but always with the Hispanic world as the common denominator, the main objective of the colloquium is to delve into current debates about culture and language, understood as dynamic and perpetually reconfiguring landscapes of intercultural communication.

METHODOLOGY

The course is structured around the presentations offered by specialists in different areas of scholarly research (Humanities, Social Sciences, Linguistics). Depending on the presenter's preference, the lectures will be delivered in Spanish or in English. They will be followed by a round of Q&A, during the second half of the session.

Students are encouraged to attend the sessions having read the bibliography specified in this program and/or provided by the presenter at a later date. Readings will be available through the course's OWL site or through links provided.

ASSESSMENT

While not a course, the colloquium is a compulsory requirement of the program. Its successful completion relies on attendance. All students (MA and PhD) must attend 100% of the sessions during their first year; during every subsequent year, they will attend at least 75% of the sessions. This means that attendance will be taken systematically by the instructor coordinating the colloquium.
